MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE SAFER NEIGHBOURHOOD BOARD HELD ON THURSDAY, 29TH SEPTEMBER, 2022

1. WELCOME & INTRODUCTIONS

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and introductions were made.

2. APOLOGIES

Apologies for absence were received from Cllr Gina Needs, (Cabinet Member, Community Safety & Cohesion), BCU Commander Caroline Haines, Superintendent Rhona Hunt, Chief Inspector Karl Curran, (A/Inspector Eren Emin in attendance on Karl's behalf) Glenn Breslin (SNB Vice-Chair), Irene Wilson, (Town CAPE) and Alok Agrawal (Southgate Green CAPE).

3. CHAIRS FEEDBACK

This has been a quiet period for the Chair of the Safer Neighbourhood Board.

In the last quarter he had attended the Hate Crime Case Management Panel. Unfortunately, he was unable to attend the Hate Crime Executive due to other commitments and was also unable to attend the LCP² meeting as it clashed with tonight's meeting.

Stop & Search Monitoring Group

Janet Marshall (SNB Vice-Chair) provided a brief overview of the work of this monitoring group and updated members on the recent meetings she had attended. Lots of information is provided at the meetings and the group question and provide constructive criticism as appropriate. A new Police Inspector has been linked to the group and there are lots of plans ahead. Janet was planning to attend a new recruits meeting which would take place during the day on the 19 October 2022.

CCTV Monitoring Group

Tim and Janet provided some background information on the role of the CCTV Monitoring Group and explained that the Council had wanted some

independent scrutiny of the CCTV cameras therefore the SNB provide volunteers who visit the CCTV centre in groups of two to view the cameras and provide feedback. Janet advised that she had recently attended a meeting of this monitoring group at which details of the new security passes for the CCTV Monitoring Centre were discussed. SNB members were encouraged to contact Tim or Janet if should they be interested in joining this monitoring group, for which training would be provided.

CAPEs and Ward Boundaries.

In response to a question from the Chair, A/Inspector Eren Emin confirmed that all the CAPEs were now working to the new ward boundaries. Eren agreed to forward details of all the new wards and CAPE Chairs to Stacey Gilmour, (SNB Secretary) in order for membership details to be updated accordingly.

Action: A/Inspector Eren Emin

In response to a question regarding the frequency of CAPE meetings A/Inspector Emin confirmed that it was standard procedure for these to be held every three months, and this was corporate across all London boroughs. SNB Members asked if the CAPE meetings dates could be booked in advance and after further discussion it was agreed that moving forward, at least two future meeting dates would be provided at the earliest opportunity.

Concerns were raised by Vickie Pite (CAPE Chair, Whitewebbs Ward) as there had been no police in attendance at their last two successive CAPE meetings. No Councillors had attended either. Therefore, as a result of this, there had been no feedback on their priorities. A/Inspector Emin apologised for the lack of police attendance and said this should not be happening. He would look into this matter and feedback accordingly.

5. PARTNERSHIP & COMMUNITY POLICING - ENFIELD CORE SCRIPT- JULY, AUGUST & SEPTEMBER 2022

A/Inspector Eren Emin went through the quarterly edition of the Core Script looking at Partnership and Community Policing in Enfield during July, August and September 2022. The following was highlighted:

- The information provided a flavour of the role profiles of the teams, some of the work the teams had been delivering and the key objectives for the coming year.
- Updates and information were provided on the following:

- Full details for each of the above can be found in the agenda pack report.
- An update was provided on the Portfolio Overview which included information on the following:
 - Safer Neighbourhoods
 - Safer Estates
 - Edmonton Green Town Centre Team
 - Operation Boxster
 - Project Taipan
 - Partnership & Prevention Hub
- Safer Neighbourhoods in Enfield is broken down into 25 wards, consisting of one Inspector, seven Sergeants, 52 PC's and 21 PCSO's. The officers work shifts between the hours of 0700-2300 7 days a week.
- Officers attend three monthly ward panel meetings to discuss current crime trends and listen to concerns of the local community and agree policing priorities for the coming months.
- There are daily high visibility patrols in hotspot areas to tackle issues such as burglary, robbery and violence against women and girls as well as conducting reassurance patrols after events that are likely to have an impact on the local communities.
- Another large part of Neighbourhood policing is dealing with long term issues within communities with a view to 'designing out crime' to stop it happening in the first place.
- Information and discussions took place on the role profiles of the Safer Neighbourhood, Safer Estates and Safer Schools Teams, their key achievements in July, August and September 2022 and their Key Objectives for 2022.
- Further information was also provided on the various police operations currently taking place which included the key objectives for 2022 as well as key achievements.
- Information was provided on the Partnership & Prevention Hub, its role profile, key areas of responsibility and Key Objectives for 2022.
- Discussions took place regarding planned operations which included Safeguarding Operations, Robbery/Violence Operations and Cross Cutting Operations. Various good news stories were also shared with the Board.
- Additional information was provided detailing BCU performance overview data for July 2022.
- Discussions took place around this data and explanations were provided to the questions raised regarding the various figures.

- Concerns were raised regarding the dramatic rise in 'purse dipping' in Enfield Town Centre as well as on public transport. A/Inspector Emin confirmed that operations were planned to address this issue, which included increased police visibility and covert operations. The transport police were on board to help tackle the increase in this crime type on public transport. Work was taking place to raise public awareness, train stations were being leafleted, lots of purse bells had been ordered and these would be cascaded to community engagement hubs via the Ward Sergeants.
- Cllr Supple raised concerns regarding the safety of the bus stop located opposite Genotin Terrace (close to Enfield Train Station). The lighting at this location was very poor and it was surrounded by bushes and trees. A/Inspector Emin made a note of this to investigate further. He also reminded SNB members that should any of their CAPES be aware of any potentially unsafe spots/danger areas within their Wards they should feed this back to their Ward Sergeants who could then liaise with the Council to look at lighting/ overgrown trees etc.
- Cllr Supple advised that the Love Your Doorstep Enfield Community School Patrol was back in Enfield Town after a short absence. It was agreed that this is a positive project which makes a difference in regard to reducing crime rates and children and young people feeling safe. However, for a scheme like this to work well, support is needed not only from parents and volunteers, but also from local schools and the police.
- Discussions took place regarding E-Scooters and clarification was provided on the powers the police hold to deal with these.
- Concerns were raised regarding the ongoing issue of speeding cars and dangerous driving on the A10 which has now plagued local residents for some considerable time, and they continue to demand action to tackle this menace. A/Inspector Emin advised that a robust strategy had been developed to tackle illegal car meets and vehicles observed committing offences were stopped and processed under Section 59 of the Police Reform Act. Officers have been able to issue fines in the first instance and seize vehicles if caught again within a twelve-month period.
- Cllr Supple advised that Bush Hill Park Councillor James Hockney has launched a petition calling for action for more cameras to be installed along the A10 from the Southbury Road junction to the Great Cambridge Roundabout following a resurgence of the problem. SNB members asked that a link to this petition be forwarded to them so that they could share it with their CAPES.

Introduction

Welcome to the next quarterly edition of the Core Script looking at Partnership and Community Policing in Enfield during October and November 2022.

We are pleased to share with you the role profiles for our teams, some of the work the teams have been delivering and our key objectives for the coming year.

Community Tensions and Notable events

Police Community Impact Assessment

Tension Levels **Elevated** – October 2022

GBH Stabbing – On Sunday 02nd October 2022 on Silver Street N18 officers were called to location of reports of a male being stabbed, officers have attended the location and found a male having sustained 3 stab wounds to the back after being attacked by 5 males. Injuries declared non-life changing or Threatening.

Attempted Murder / Shooting - On Saturday 01st October 2022 officers received calls to Raynham Road N18 to reports of a male being shot. Officers have attended the location and found the casing of a 9mm bullet. A second call was received to North Middlesex hospital of a male self presenting with a gunshot wound. The address for the original call was the home address of the victim of murder in Tottenham and at the time of the shooting a wake was taking place at the location. Victim of the shooting had sustained a gunshot wound to the chest/armpit .

Aggravated Burglary – On Wednesday 05th October 2022 officers were called to attend Hadley Road EN2, victim has returned home and found 4 suspects within the address stealing belongings all armed with knives and axes. Victim has stated during the whole incident her grandparents were within the address and both suffering from panic attacks as a result of the incident.

X2 Section 60 – Section 60 - Section 60 authorised by Inspector Kane covering the following areas, Ferry Lane to the south, A406 to the North, A10 to the west. This is due to heightened gang tensions.

Dates: 05/10/2022 1810 hrs – 0600hrs 06/10/2022

Dates: 03/10/2022 0200hrs – 0002hrs 04/10/2022.

Traveller Encampment – On Tuesday 04th October 2022 officers received calls to attend Picketts Lock Lane N9 to reports of a traveller encampment with the vehicles blocking access to local businesses.

Firearms Discharge – On Wednesday 12th October 2022 officers received numerous calls to attended Canning Square EN1 to reports of a firearm being discharged. Officers have attended a established the firearm being used was a high powered air rifle with ball Barings recovered on scene. Damage caused to windows on scene. One suspect arrested on scene firearm not located.

Stabbing / burglary – On Wednesday 12th October 2022 officers were called to attend Granary Close N9 to reports of a burglary. 4 males have entered the property wearing balaclavas pushing there way past and stabbing the victim in the back with a machete. Injuries non-life changing or Threatening.

Stabbing – On Wednesday 12th October 2022 officers were called to attend Bridlington Road N9 to reports of a male having been stabbed. Victim has been stabbed in the shoulder, a slash to the other shoulder and a third to the torso. Believed to be linked to the above burglary.

Tension Levels **Elevated** – October 2022

Report of an MP and two Councillors being harassed - On Tuesday 11th October an MP reported since August 2022 a male has been in touch with them on numerous occasions with 'conspiracy theories' about members of the TURKISH community causing corruption in parliament. Communications have been in various forms, written, in person and on social media. It was previously reported to the police but the MP did not want police to take action against the suspect. On Tuesday 11th October the suspect made repeated phone calls before attending their office in Hertford Road, EN3. This is now being investigated by Local Investigations and safe guarding measures have been put in place.

Exposure – On Wednesday 12th October 2022 a 10 year old girl was on route to school on Armfield Road EN2, when a male approximate age 40 years old has exposed himself to her.

Stabbing – On Wednesday 12th October 2022 officers were called to attend Hertford Road N9 to reports of a male having been stabbed. Victim has stated that he has walked past the suspect in the street when the suspect has pulled out a knife and slashed the victim's hand. The injuries required surgery with the victim suffering a hairline fracture to his hand and a severed tendon to his wrist requiring surgery to re-attach. Also possibly linked to the 2 previous stabbings.

Domestic Stabbing – On Wednesday 12th October 2022 officers were called to Hertford Road N9 the same location as above to reports of a female being stabbed. Victim has sustained a single stab wound to the stomach. Initial account was a drunk male had stabbed her in the stomach but through further investigation it is suspected that the victim's partner had caused the injury and was subsequently arrested for GBH with intent. Non-Life changing or threatening injuries.

Kidnap / Murder – On Friday 14th October 2022 reports were received that a male and female had been kidnapped. On Saturday 15th October 2022 the female was located in Kentish Town where she has been left by the suspects. On Sunday 16th October 2022 the male (victim) was found deceased in Essex. On going investigation due to the nature limited details can be shared.

School Conflict – On Friday 14th October 2022 reports were received of a planned fight to take place between Enfield Grammar and college of Haringey. No incident took place following a high police presence in the area,

Stabbing – On Sunday 16th October 2022 reports received of a male sustaining a stab wound to his abdomen Cocker Road EN1. Account provided is that the victim and suspect are known to each other and following a heated argument the suspect has stabbed the victim in the abdomen. Injuries non-life threatening or changing.

Section 60 – N9 east of the A10 Following 4 stabbings around the same location a section 60 was authorised from the following hours.
Date: 12/10/2022 – 13/10/2022 AT 0400hrs.

Tension Levels **Elevated** – October 2022

Firearms Incident – On Wednesday 19th October 2022 on East Road EN3 reports were received of 2 males fighting with one with a sharp instrument. It has then reported the second male has entered the address returning with a rifle. Male with rifle arrested and 2 firearms recovered.

GBH Stabbing – On Sunday 23rd October 2022 reports were received of a male being stabbed. Victim has left his home address making his way to football when a blue saloon car has pulled up and the suspect has exited the vehicle shouting towards the victim. The suspect has then pulled out a knife slashing the victim three times. Injuries to the victims thigh, shin and slash on the face.

Fatal car Collison – On Sunday 23rd October 2022 a collision has occurred between a car and a light goods van. The car has attempted to overtake on a blind bend in the wet and has collided head on with the van. The driver has sustained serious injuries and was transported to hospital. The passenger has passed away on scene.

Rape - On Sunday 23rd October 2022 the victim was walking through Pymmes Park N18 on route home when a known male to the victim has approached her forcing the victim to engage in sexual intercourse.

GBH Stabbing – On Thursday 27th October 2022 officers were flagged down by a member of public on South Street EN3 stating that a male had been stabbed. Victim has stated that he was approached by the suspect who was asking where he was from when the suspect has attempted the victim with a machete. Victim sustained a stab wound to the hand.

Attempted Abduction of a child – On Saturday 29th October 2022 in Jubilee Park N9 the victim has reported that she was with her child at the park when a male/female was seen holding her 4 year old child's hand walking off. The victim has challenged the suspect who thought the child was not with anyone.

Tension Levels **Elevated** – November 2022

Travellers – Picketts Lock Lane N9

On 14th November 2022 reports were received of 6-7 caravans located at the location with motorbikes. Reports received from residents that youths connected to the caravans were in his garden and they had broken his fence.

Car Meet – Tesco, Savoy Parade

Multiple calls from members of the public on 13th November 2022 of vehicles racing in Southbury Road, reported 20 cars in attendance. Drivers moved on by officers and an airspace created due to complains from local residents stating this happens regularly.

Travellers – Enfield Playing Fields

On 11th November 2022 reports were received calls that travellers had broken into the playing fields at the location and five caravans and five cars were parked at the location.

RTC – Bullsmoor Lane EN1

On 10th November 2022 officers received calls from members of the public to reports that a pedestrian had been hit by a moped with the moped becoming airborn and landing on the curb. Victim who was hit was an 11 year old girl who sustained a deep laceration to the back of the head, pain in the hips and legs.

Male on scaffolding – Orpington Road

On 7th November 2022 a male suffering with a mental health episode was detained under 136 of the mental health act when he has made off from officers. The male has then climbed up scaffolding at the location removing roof tiles to cause damage to himself. Significant emergency presence on scene trying to negotiate the male to come down. After a period of time the male has come down by himself and conveyed to hospital.

Suspicious circumstances – Cineworld Southbury Road.

On 05th November 2022 the manager of Cineworld has called police reporting 20 – 30 youths in the car park of the venue having a “face off”, all wearing balaclavas and being hostile. Security have challenged the youths who were consuming balloons at the location.

Fireworks – Enfield Town Park EN2

Intelligence received that a snapchat advertisement has gone out in relation to a fireworks shootout to take place at the location on 05th November 2022. A similar incident took place at Stratford shopping centre during Halloween

Funeral – Edmonton Islamic centre

On Thursday 03rd November 2022 intelligence received that a funeral would be held at the Edmonton Islamic centre for x2 males who were victims of a triple shooting in Ilford.

Protest – Pavillion Business Centre –

On 02nd November 2022 Informant has called police stating that several persons were protesting outside the venue in relation to the non payment of Irish farmers and they were harassing staff. Officers attended located several persons who were not committing any offences.






Robbery Offences by BCU (FYTD)













Safer Neighbourhoods

Role Profile and Key Objectives for 2022

Safer Neighbourhoods in Enfield is broken down into 21 wards, consisting of one Inspector, seven Sergeants 52 PC's and 21 PCSO's. The officers work shifts between the hours of 0700 – 2300 7 days a week.

Primarily Neighbourhoods policing centres around engagement with our key stakeholders, partners & most importantly our local community. Engagement takes many forms such as;

- Contact sessions
- Pop up meetings in the street
- Community events
- Public forums with the Local Authority
- Burglary cocooning for vulnerable victims

Our officers attend three monthly ward panel meetings to discuss current crime trends and listen to concerns of the local community and agree policing priorities for the coming months.

There are daily high visibility patrols in hotspot areas to tackle issues such as Burglary, Robbery and violence against women and girls as well as conducting reassurance patrols after events that are likely to have an impact on the local communities. During these patrols officers are proactive in dealing with issues such as drinking/drug taking and anti-social behaviour that affects the quality of life for many people.

Another large part of Neighbourhood policing is dealing with long term issues within communities, this can take many forms such as mediation and regular welfare visits to resolve problems amicably when possible but also include planning and executing warrants and making arrests when required.

Key Objectives.

Disrupting Criminal Activity- Officers continue to proactively identify criminal activity within their wards and where appropriate take action which includes warrants, closing premises down, arresting offenders and safeguarding persons when able. Each ward has its own issues and officers are dedicated to engage with the public and try to combat these issues robustly and effectively. ASB issues are identified and ward officers tackle the issues head on using the powers that are available to them. For example the Closure order issued to 1 Isis House after persistent drug dealing and ASB by the occupant on Upper Edmonton ward.

Regular community events- which help to build relationships with the public on each ward and keep the ward panels informed by holding regular CAPE meetings. This includes working with partner agencies to strengthen communication between all agencies and the public and build trust within the communities we serve in London. Community events take place on all wards and are relevant to the particular ward at the time and what the public concerns are as well as from a policing need. These range from VAWG initiative at North Middlesex Hospital where Police held an engagement event followed by a 'walk and talk' with members of the public to discuss their safety concerns to a Stop and search workshop with 30+ Somali women in Lower Edmonton who had expressed concerns about this tactic and its impact on their children/youth in the area



Operation STORM An address was identified as causing ASB within an estate upper Edmonton, it soon became a trap house with a number of youths selling drugs in the area from this address. Following months of intel work and identifying suspects 9 males were arrested and drugs were recovered from the premises.

On 19/10 PC Speid Enfield Town Ward stopped a male in Aldersbrook Park and had reason to search him. Within his bag he was carrying was a Black Handled Kitchen knife Male subsequently arrested and charged with Possession of Offensive Weapon

On 26/10 Enfield Town ward officers chased a male after decamping from a stolen motor vehicle. Male was eventually detained on Chase Side, Enfield where he was arrested for Handling Stolen goods namely a stolen motor vehicle and stolen number plates. He was also identified and arrested for FOUR burglary offences within Enfield. Male has been charged and remanded and awaits court sentencing.

OP Ghostfreak results;

Over the past 6 months, since 01/05/2022, we have conducted 8 specific operations at Enfield to target car meetings, called Operation Ghost Freak.

These operations have involved, traffic patrols, local neighbourhood officers and special constabulary.

We have seized 21 vehicles for a variety of offences including no insurance, breach of section 59 warnings and dangerous driving. Some of these vehicles have been seized from home addresses.

We have posted 300 warning letters and issued 70 section 59 warnings, which are placed on the Police National Computer (second warning vehicles can be seized) for 12 months.

91 people have been summons for traffic related offences, including defective exhausts, dangerous parts, careless driving and defective tyres.

We have made 13 arrests for a variety of offences including drug dealing, possession of drugs, possession of offensive weapons and drug/drink driving. Importantly, one person arrested for public nuisance, for organising these car meetings. Two organisers have been served Community Protection Notices which last for 12 months with conditions.



Safer Schools

Role Profile and Key Objectives for 2022

The Safer Schools team work closely with Head Teachers and Safeguarding Leads within the schools to ensure the correct balance between engagement and enforcement is achieved and pursuing a restorative approach where appropriate. Safer Schools Officers also work in partnership with other agencies to safeguarding children's welfare and/or divert them from criminal activity and ASB.

The team regularly deliver student presentations to secondary schools on crime prevention and personal safety as well as delivering presentations to primary schools to establish early intervention and improve trust and confidence in police.

Additionally our Safer Schools Officers carry out regular patrols in the vicinity of the schools to address, truancy, ASB and crime, working with Safer Transport and Safer Neighbourhood colleagues.

The team are also responsible for the Student Ward Panels, to set school policing priorities

Key Objectives for 2022

- Prevent and reduce violence affecting young people in North Area
- Work in partnership with school communities
- Reduce and prevent offending behaviour affecting young people

Safer Schools key Achievements.

Officers from various specialist units in the Metropolitan police attended Enfield County school as part of the National Inclusion week to showcase the various roles we have within policing including covert operations, uniform roles and the detective side of policing.

This careers fair style engagement reached hundreds of 14-18 years old young women within Enfield. By hosting this inclusion week, we hope to inspire young women and increase our workforce of both women and women of colour from black, Asian heritage and other backgrounds to reflect the communities we serve.

On Friday 11 November 2022, Safer School officers attended a parent's information day at West Lea School. Officers shared their knowledge and signposted parents to useful services. Following on from the event officers received fantastic feedback from attendees.

On Monday, 7th November, Safer Schools Officer's arranged for our mounted branch colleagues to attend West Lea special education school at their Haselbury Campus.

This collaboration was to aid in the "people who help us" lessons to bridge the gap between services like the police and young people to improve perceptions.

The horses (and their riders) behaved very well and were excellent ways to open the conversation around what the police do

By using the horses as a means of making the children comfortable questions surrounding the horses such as "how do horses brush their teeth" and "what are the horses' favourite food" changed to "how do the horses help the police" and "what equipment do you have".

Successful Conviction for Sexual Assault and Witness Intimidation.

On 2nd June 2022 SSOs PC Banks and PC Palmer reported an incident of Sexual Assault and Assault, where a man touched a young women in the street then spat at her. After extensive enquiries he was eventually arrested which began a two year old journey of preparing the case and court hearings.

The verdict of the first trial was a hung jury (not a majority decision) and a re-trial was ordered by the Judge. As the suspect was leaving the dock he made threats towards the victim and left the court. The judge instructed the victim and their family to be escorted to safety as a result. The suspect was found in the building by security and remanded in custody by the Judge. The suspect was taken to Pentoville Prison, PC Banks and PC Palmer went there to interview him. A further charge of witness intimidation was authorised, more paperwork and the two cases were joined.

A new trial was held.

The Jury gave a **GUILTY** verdict and was sentenced to –

15 months custody suspended for 24 months

Sexual Offenders Register – 10 years

35 days Horizon requirement

40 days Rehabilitation Activity Requirement

Restraining Order- 5 years (Not to contact directly or indirectly the female victim)

Safer Estates

Role Profile and Key Objectives for 2022

A dedicated team working in partnership with Enfield Local Authority to target ASB and crime, safeguard vulnerable persons and engage with the community and local residents in nominated housing estates.

The team take a high visibility proactive approach in responding to issues whilst working towards satisfactory conclusions for all involved. The team are made up one Sergeant and 15 Constables.

Key Objectives for 2022

- Support the local authority with a visible presence whilst working in line with MPS aspirations
- Increase community and public confidence for patrolled areas and surrounding environs
- Target and reduce ASB and crime to support the community, residents and Local Authority in key patrol areas

SAFER ESTATES KEY ACHIEVEMENTS.

The team has six priority areas, decided by the Council, that it looks at and these are currently Ayleycroft, Joyce Avenue & Snells Park, The Lytchett Estate, Exeter Road, The Shires and The Red Brick Estate. The Estates each present unique challenges in terms of crime and associated ASB. The areas can be susceptible to becoming crime attractors by virtue of individuals visiting and in some cases living on those Estates

Crime attractor address visited. Well known nominal located, arrested as wanted on a recall to prison. Returned to HMP on 26/10/22.

Fail to Appear and breach release licence conditions on 12/10/2022 Routine patrol when intelligence indicated a wanted male may be nearby. Male located and arrested for failing to appear for offensive weapon and driving offences. He had also breached his multiple probation licence conditions. A male that we had previously found in possession of 107 wraps of class a drugs, had been charged with two counts of PWITS. The court had bailed him. He had breached this bail and despite not having an address was tracked down and put back in front of the court.

Following a positive stop and search of an Registered Sex Offender, subject was discovered to be in possession of 24 individual deal size wraps of class A drugs. These were tested and confirmed to be crack cocaine and heroin. His mobile phone was seized and later discovered that he had breached his sexual harm prevention order, as he was a Jigsaw managed offender and had failed to disclose possession of this. Charged for both counts of possession with intent to supply and breaching his SHPO whilst in custody.



Edmonton Green Town Centre Team

Role Profile and Key Objectives for 2022

Since 14th February 2022 Edmonton Green has a dedicated Town Centre Team consisting of one Inspector, three Sergeants and 21 PC's split over three teams. The shifts are created around demand with a core day shift 0900-1900 hours 7 days per week with later shifts until 0200 Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

This will be reducing to one Inspector, two sergeants and six PC's for a limited time from December.

The primary focus of the TCT is violence reduction with an emphasis on serious youth violence and violence against women and girls, while rebuilding trust and confidence. This will be achieved through high visibility policing in intelligence led hot spots and by working in partnership with local stakeholders including business owners and youth groups to understand root causes and work together to provide long term solutions to ongoing problems.



Operation Boxster

Role Profile and Key Objectives for 2022



Operation Boxster is a dedicated police unit assigned to;

- Reduce the number of sex workers on North Area
- Safeguard vulnerable sex workers
- Assist outreach teams divert women from sex work
- Tackle anti-social behaviour caused or committed by sex workers on Fore Street and High Rd N22.

The unit is made up of one Sergeant and five Constables. The aim of the unit is to target males who exploit sex workers, safeguard vulnerable woman and assist in diverting individuals from sex work. The unit proactively patrols a designated footprint to disrupt crime and deal with all anti social behaviour associated with sex work.

Since August 2021 Operation Boxster has made over 195 arrests of individuals within the deployments area. These have included drug, weapon seizures and arrests of males exploiting sex workers either by using the services of street sex workers or controlling their actions and financially benefiting from prostitution. A total of 126 males have now been arrested by the unit for the offence of soliciting a woman for the purpose of prostitution. Males which are eligible are then offered a educational course run by one of our partner agencies Streetlights UK which informs the males of the risks to themselves and the sex workers they seek to use. Seventeen of these courses have now been run and the money obtained by the males who attend the course are used to help divert sex workers from sex working.

In July Ps Davey was invited to present the work of the unit at an event to launch project Evergreen which is the MPS initiative to look at all aspects of sex working in London. The work conducted by Operation Boxster is seen as an example of best practise and the tactics and methods will be used and replicated in areas of London which experience the issue of street sex working. In addition the MPS has commissioned an academic paper which is will be written by two professors from UCL looking in depth at the approaches and attitudes of sex workers by the MPS. Operation Boxster will be taking part in this research and the work of the unit will be assessed and reviewed as part of this academic work.

In the last three months several joint operations and intelligence gathering patrols have taken place with officers from the Central Specialist Crime Modern Slavery Unit.

The details of this work can not be published but officers are working with these officers to combat individuals involved in the trafficking and exploitation of sex workers brought into the country to work on NA. This has included liaison and intelligence requests with international policing services. The joint outreach and diversion work on NA is reaping some incredible successes. The work of The Salvation Army and Streetlights UK during their street outreach has led to numerous historic sex workers engaging and leaving sex work. The support mechanisms from emergency housing and drug treatments which the outreach team has been fighting hard to obtain has managed more exits in the last six months than in the entire last five years.

The sex workers exiting are providing intelligence and insight on the how they got into sex work and how outreach teams and police can have a greater impact and present more opportunities to sex workers wanting to leave sex work.

There has been an increase in sex worker complaints over the last eight weeks. This coincides with the high level of abstractions the team has had. With the dramatic increase in the cost of living there is a real danger that we will see significant increases in sex workers on the street. There have been several interactions with new or returning sex workers who have stated that they have turned to sex work in order to make ends meet.

It should be recognised that with the increased pressure financially due to the cost of living more people will turn to sex working in order to try to survive.

Project Taipan

Role Profile and Key Objectives for 2022

A dedicated Neighbourhood proactive tasking team who devise and utilise tactics to engage with the public whilst supporting the community and target crime and offenders.

Project Taipan work with partner agencies to deliver quality outcomes and are at the forefront of proactive policing. The team are made up of one Sergeant and seven Constables

Key Objectives for 2022

- Reduction in Violent Crime in footprint where deployed
- Increase public confidence for deployment area
- Address criminality in key locations whilst making a positive impact in line with MPS aspirations

Key Achievements

Tri borough week of action has been in the Finsbury Park/Blackstock Road and surrounding areas.
The week of action was a NA, CN and CE operation lead by Taipan with the assistance of STT, VSU and MO7 Dogs

The figures for the week were fantastic:

15 x Arrests – All of these were charged with offences including PWITS A, PWITS B, Possession of Knife, HSG, Burglary, violence to give an example of offences.

28 x Stop & Search – positive stop % above Met average

8 x Immigration referrals

6 x Traffic reports

2 x Vehicle seizure

4 x Weapons seized

12 x CRIMINTS

3 x PND for Drugs Possession

3 x Community Resolutions for Drugs Possession



A Warrant took place at a phone shop on Blackstock Road which is believed to be buying stolen phones. This lead to:

- 1248 x Canisters of Nos Seized
- 110 x believed stolen phones Seized
- 14 x believed stolen watches Seized
- 5 x believed stolen Laptops/Tablets
- Approximately £7000 cash seized
- Large quantity of cigarettes seized from HMRC

We had a day with Immigration enforcement out with us. This lead to:

- 2 x immigration arrests
- 6 x immigration bails
- £3900 in cash seized
- Fake ID documents

We had the Homeless outreach workers out with us. This lead to the removal of the tents from inside the park. We have also assisted in the BCU homeless Spocs communicating and sharing best practise.

Design out Crime team was used to assist in stopping the criminals from continuing their drugs activities and locations where weapons are being stored to address the issues when Police leave the area.

We have had a lot of positive comments from residents and business owners.

Partnership & Prevention Hub

Role Profile and Key Objectives for 2022

The Partnership and Prevention Hub consists of one Inspector, two sergeants and 12 PC's. The key areas of responsibility are;


- Licensing

CMARAC- Haringey and Enfield have continued to keep a great uptake of partnership working and have received good referrals from this.

PAI's- Positive Activity Initiative. (PAI) below have been the PAI's that have taken place between October and November.

Edmonton Green TCT – Start: 1st October 2022 for three week period
Highlights VAWG based PAI with late night early hour patrols in hotspot areas of their ward, and engagement work with local late night businesses in the area.

Wood Green TCT – Start: 5th October 2022 for three week period
Highlights engagement work in hot spot areas to reduce violent/volume crimes & ASB Issues from occurring. Positive feedback from Community event that was carried out in Shopping Mall with MET Volunteers. This was also a VAWG based PAI and patrols were catered to be visible late at night/early hours of the morning in High Road/Park areas/Tube stations.

Upper Edmonton Ward – Start: 31st October 2022 for six week period.
Highlights to date – Weapon Sweep conducted – Large knife found/recovered in and around the Estate's area.
“Walk About” with Police team/Council/Community members in hot spot areas of the ward on 23rd November 2022 between 8pm-10pm

Brimsdown Ward – Start: 1st November 2022 for three week period. (100 days commissioner in Office PAI)
Highlights to date – To help reduce Robberies & Burglaries on the ward. I organised an Op with Safer Transport Team – One male was arrested as shown WM for PWITS and other drug Offences, he was in possession of a large knife and stolen Motorbike. Vehicle recovered to its owner after being stolen a week prior on the same ward. Male is Prolific gang member. Knife Arch also conducted around the Brimsdown Station/Green Street EN3 area with Safer Transport/BTP – One arrest for a breach. Op Sceptre also incorporated in Op Skaleka.

Wood Green TCT – Start: 28th November for a three week period. Working alongside Council's Week of Action. Also Op Nightingale hotspot area.

P&P - Continue to roll out VAWG and Ask Angela training borough wide.

Football licensing visits take place on match days.

Licensing checks completed with some breaches and action taken place- Issues around O'Neill's actively actioned and successful interaction to prevent review.

Mental Health First Aid Course- The P&P hub secured funding and joint collaboration with MIND to deliver a incredible opportunity to educate our front line officers and Blue light champions on the borough in a Mental health first Aid course. This has been ongoing since July and will continue into December. This will be delivered to 192 officers of all ranks and has been well received by participants in the course so far.

Behind the Badge-The aim of the “Behind the Badge” initiative is to build trust, confidence and legitimacy in the MPS by humanising our officers and educating the public around the diversity of roles, rewards and challenges that policing officers face. In order to engage with local communities, we use hyper-local radio stations and social media. We aim to engage with audiences that have historically been seldom heard with more mainstream media. This has now developed into face to face Behind the Badge events working well partnership with Outreach teams.

Ward Panel directed pilots/activity based on Ward Priorities. Individual ward panels will be encouraged to try good practice and innovative ways of tackling ASB, violence including youth and violence against women and girls and crime affecting local communities.

OWL- Enfield currently has 3060 residents signed up

Haringey currently has 1128 residents signed up

Enfield has 591 cameras and 445 residents on Dog Watch

Haringey has 199 cameras and 145 residents on Dog watch

Planned Operations

OP RUSTY- Operation Rusty is the response to violent crimes in the Fore St N18 and surrounding estates area. The intention is to reduce violence with injury crimes, robbery and possession of offensive weapons.

OP GHOSTFREAK- Operation Ghostfreak continues for SNT officers working in partnership with Roads Transport Police and Dog section, resulting in some fantastic results to disturb and disrupt the car meets and offences being committed.

Op Rezzoch- Project Taipan's deployment in Finsbury Park which is running in line with **OP Nightingale** Joint operations being carried out all over the borough, utilising all Safer Neighbourhoods portfolios working together to reduce violent crime and VWAG offences. In six known problem areas we have Pinpointed known areas, offence types, peak times and known suspect targeting these offenders primarily.

Safeguarding Operations

Op Verona, tackling the rise in sexual offences in North Area

- A Multi Agency approach incorporating reassurance patrols, community engagement and a communication strategy to keep the community updated and involved

Robbery/Violence Operations

Op Raphael, reducing youth related robberies and youth violence in Enfield, and to eliminate community concerns regarding the recent rise in robberies

- Targeted hotspot patrols and weapons sweeps

OP PSYDUCK - Has been created due to an increase in the number of Catalytic Converter thefts in NA BCU over the last 6 months. The main targeted vehicles are: Honda Jazz, CRV and Civic (33%) and Toyota Prius, Auris and Yaris (27%). Catalytic Converters contain a small amount of precious metals (Palladium, Platinum and Rhodium) with new parts costing from £1,000 up to £2,000 on average. The resale value of these parts are believed to vary from £250 to £500 again dependant on the vehicle. The analysis shows that there are a number of repeat locations on NA with Glover Drive N18 being targeted 36 times in this period. This is where Tesco and Ikea have superstores with large capacity car parks believed covered by CCTV. Task planned: Proactive patrols targeting high theft areas, analysis breakdown of each ward has been completed and shows each wards targeted areas.

OP NIGHTINGALE- Op Nightingale represents the Met's response to combat and reduce violence, robberies and anti-social behavior. This is to be achieved by the introduction of (and furtherance of existing) partnership work with key internal and external stakeholders to ultimately increase the trust and confidence in the MPS within this area. Joint operations are being carried out all over the borough, utilising all Safer Neighbourhoods portfolios working together to reduce violent crime and VWAG offences. In six known problem areas we have Pinpointed known areas, offence types, peak times and known suspect targeting these offenders primarily.

OP SCEPTRE- Officers from across the Met will be deployed a range of enforcement and preventative tactics to reduce knife crime and wider violence in the capital. There will be a focus on deterring and dealing with those who carry knives, by conducting intelligence-led stop and search, weapons sweeps and deploying knife arches in violence hot spots. Officers will be infiltrating the places where violence occurs, and removing the most prolific high harm offenders and habitual knife carriers from our streets. We know that drugs are inextricably linked to a high proportion of the violence in London and officers will continue to target those who exploit the most vulnerable individuals to peddle drugs through conducting a number of warrants. Officers will also be engaging with businesses to ensure they have checks in place to prevent young people from buying knives in their stores.


