1 WELCOME AND APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Councillor Gunes as Chair welcomed all attendees to the meeting, and explained the order of the meeting.

2 DECLARATION OF INTERESTS

NOTED there were no declarations of interest in respect of the items on the agenda.

3 TOTO LOUNGE & BAR LTD, 74 ALDERMANS HILL, LONDON, N13 4PP

RECEIVED the application for a new premises licence at the premises known as Toto Lounge & Bar Ltd, situated at 74 Aldermans Hill, London, N13 4PP.

NOTED

- 1. The introduction by Ellie Green, Principal Licensing Officer, including:
 - a. The premises had held a premises licence previously, for a convenience store, although this licence is currently suspended due to non-payment of annual fees. The licence holder of that licence is completely different to the applicant for this new application, which is Toto Lounge & Bar Ltd. The only director of this company is Mr Alfons Prifti, who is also the proposed Designated Premises Supervisor with this application.

b. The new application is for a Restaurant Café and Coffee Shop seeking supply of alcohol on supply and late-night refreshment until midnight latest. The full timings and activities now sought are set out in Table 3 of the report, see the table in the Supplementary Report, namely:

- c. The Police did not make any representation to this application.
- d. The Licensing Authority objected to the full hours sought, and an agreement to the times and conditions has now been made so that representation is now withdrawn. The final agreed conditions between the applicant and the Licensing Authority are set out in Annex 9 of the report.
- e. The only outstanding representations are from Other Persons, namely 11 local residents who have also objected to the application in its entirety. Those representations are set out in Annex 5, from page 49 of the report.
- 2. The statement of Mr Alfons Prifti (applicant) made by Mr Fabien Simms of FSL Consultants on behalf of the applicant:
 - a. The reduced hours proposed had been agreed.
 - b. The primary objective of the business was to provide coffee and a high-quality range of produce. It will be a sit-down café/restaurant and not a bar/nightclub as suggested by the interested parties. The sale of alcohol would be only for on-sales.
 - c. It will be waiter service and open to all members of the public. The aim is not for customers to get intoxicated and any that do will be removed from the premises.
 - d. The premises will benefit the community and have no detrimental impact on the area. Issues with other businesses in the area are not to do with this application.
 - e. Customers come through the main door and the outside rear area holds around 20 customers. The premises is a small and intimate venue.
 - f. Each complaint had been considered and no concerns or representations were made from the police or noise nuisance team. Mr Prifti had never been in trouble with the law and the allegations made were unfounded.
- 3. In response, the following comments and questions were received:

- a. Cllr Savva raised concerns about litter, noise and staff training. Mr Prifti stated that he had already been keeping the front of the shop clean, even though the business was not yet trading. In relation to staff training, the condition around this had already been agreed. Staff would receive regular training and records would be kept.
- b. Cllr Smith asked if cooked food would be served. Mr Prifti confirmed that food such as pastries and paninis would be warmed up, however there was not a fully functioning kitchen to prepare fully cooked meals.
- c. It was questioned and then confirmed that the condition in annex 9 point 9 had been agreed by the applicant.
- d. In response to questions about chairs and tables on the pavement at the front of the shop, it was confirmed this was not planned and a new licence would need to be applied for to allow this.
- e. It was highlighted that the noise team had served a section 60 notice. Mr Simms stated it was a warning about building noise and once it was received the applicant resolved the issue which was a one-off occasion by a tiler. The IP disagreed and said the noise continued.
- f. In response to Cllr Taylor's query, the applicant was not aware of any breaches to planning permission. The structure at the rear was owned and retained by the landlord. The legal representative advised it was not relevant to this application.
- g. There was a discussion related to an extension to the rear of the property. Mr Simms clarified that it was not extension but works to the garden which were all completed in accordance with building regulations. A slanted cover had been installed to cover a seated area in the garden. The work to the garden had taken around two months, on and off.
- 4. The statement from IP3 on behalf of interested parties/residents:
 - a. There were already multiple bars and coffee shops in the area and adding to this would create more issues with parking and litter. The builders had left rubbish and were working out of hours creating a noise nuisance. Eleven complaints were made to the council. It was felt there had been zero respect to the residents.
 - b. There were issues with the building height, cut wires, blocked ventilation and concerns about behaviour towards women.
 - c. Cllr Taylor drew attention to Annex 5 of the report detailing IP representations. There were many incidents of noise and issues with trust.
- 5. In response, the following comments and questions were received:
 - a. It was questioned if music was permitted within the licence. Ellie Green advised that rules state if alcohol is permitted then live and recorded music can be played between 8am and 11pm. This application does not seek music on the licence.

- b. In regard to the prevention of nuisance, it was felt building works did not meet conditions and there was a lack of concern for neighbours.
- c. The applicant clarified that the noise issue was due to a tiler cutting tiles out of hours which was dealt with promptly. All work was now complete, and he wished to start his business.
- d. IP3 felt that residents' complaints were not dealt with and referred to emails with Mr Islam. Ellie Green confirmed that a section 60 notice was served and sent to the applicant by recorded delivery. The applicant confirmed he received this and followed it up as was concerned about a £20,000 fine. Ellie Green advised that prosecution would take place if the noise continued; there were no further records after the notice was issued.
- e. IPs had referred to the premises as a bar and Mr Simms wished to clarify that it was not a bar and therefore negative comments associated with bars cannot be attached. Cllr Taylor highlighted that the name contained the word "bar" which was confusing. Mr Prifti was considering this.
- f. It was noted that a lot of building work had been taking place in the area, included the rear of the premises which were not linked to this application. IP3 appreciated this, however, lives very nearby and can tell where the noise is coming from, for example noise on a Sunday morning at 6.30am in May 2022. Mr Prifti stated that at that time of day it would only be him working and he denies it.
- g. Mr Prifti confirmed there would be no shisha in the rear garden.
- h. Regarding opening hours, Ellie Green provided details of opening and closing times for similar businesses in the area, which were broadly in line with this application.
- 6. The summary statement of Ellie Green, Principal Licensing Officer:
 - a. Having heard these representations from both parties, it is now for the Committee to consider whether the new premises licence application is appropriate, and in support of the licensing objectives.
 - b. The licensing sub-committee must decide whether to:
 - grant the application subject to the mandatory conditions and such conditions as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives;
 - exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
 - Or, reject the application in full.

RESOLVED that

1. In accordance with the principles of Section 100(a) of the Local Government Act 1972 to exclude the press and public from the meeting for this item of business on the grounds that it involves the likely

disclosure of exempt information as defined in Paragraph 7 of Part 1 of Schedule 12A to the Act.

The Panel retired, with the legal representative and committee administrator, to consider the application further and then the meeting reconvened in public.

2. The Chair made the following statement:

"The Licensing Sub-Committee (LSC) having considered written and oral submissions made by the Licensing Authority, the Applicant and the Interested Parties (IPs) has decided to grant the application in part. The LSC was concerned to restrict noise nuisance in a mainly residential area and has resolved to include a condition 9b which would restrict access to the garden area to 23.00 hours from Monday to Sunday. Therefore, drinks will not be served to customers in the rear garden area after 22:30 and customers shall not be allowed to use the rear garden area of the premises after 23:00 hours on Monday to Sunday. This will promote the licensing objectives of the Prevention of Public Nuisance.

The LSC has considered the statutory guidance and the London Borough of Enfield's Policy Statement in making its decision and has made its decision in promoting the four licensing objectives and in particular that of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Prevention of Public Nuisance."

3. The Licensing Sub-Committee resolved to grant the application in part.

PLEASE NOTE: This review application initially went to a hearing on 14 December 2022 but was adjourned to this new date due to technical difficulties as the hearing was held virtually, on MS Teams Live Events.

1 LICENSING HISTORY & CURRENT POSITION - LN/200600265:

- 1.1 The premises has been previously known as Station Stores, and Royal News before being named Maxi Food & Wine.
- 1.2 On 23 June 2006, a new premises licence application which was not subject to any representations, was granted by officers in accordance with delegated powers, naming Mr Kandasamy Nirmalan as the Premises Licence Holder (PLH) and also as the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS).
- 1.3 On 27 May 2011, a transfer application which was not subject to any representations, was granted by officers in accordance with delegated powers, naming Mr Gurdeep Singh Kahlon as the Premises Licence Holder (PLH), and also became the DPS.
- 1.4 On 6 September 2021, a transfer application which was not subject to any representations, was granted by officers in accordance with delegated powers, naming Mr Dervis Altun as the Premises Licence Holder (PLH), and also became the DPS.
- 1.5 On 12 May 2021, Mr Dervis Altun surrendered premises licence LN/200600265, as he stated he had not been owner of this premises for some time.
- On 7 June 2021, a transfer application which was not subject to any representations, was granted by officers in accordance with delegated powers, naming Mrs Aylin Yengin as the Premises Licence Holder (PLH), and also became the DPS. The transfer application was permitted as it was

- submitted within the timeframe permitted by the Act to transfer a surrendered premises licence.
- 1.7 The premises has not submitted any minor variation applications to add conditions.
- 1.8 The premises licence LN/200600265 has not been subject to a review application previously.
- 1.9 The current Premises Licence LN/200600265 permits:
- 1.9.1 Hours the premises are open to the public: 06:30 to 23:00 daily.
- 1.8.2 Supply of alcohol (off supplies only): 06:30 to 23:00 daily.
- 1.9 A copy of the current premises licence LN/200600265 is attached in the Trading Standards review application appendices, namely Appendix 6 in Annex 1.

2.0 THIS APPLICATION:

- 2.1 On 26 October 2022 an application was made by Enfield Council's Trading Standards for the review of Premises Licence LN/200600265 and is produced in Annex A.
- 2.2 The Appendices to support the Trading Standards review are produced in Annex B
- 2.3 Trading Standards have produced additional information to support the review application, which is produced in Annex C.
- 2.4 The review application has been submitted as Trading Standards believes that Mrs Aylin Yengin is not promoting the prevention of crime and disorder licensing objective. A wide range of unlawful activity has taken place whilst Mrs Aylin Yengin has been the premises licence holder, despite advice to prevent such activity having been provided by the Council previously. The unlawful activity includes:
 - illicit tobacco has been seized from the premises;
 - breaches of licence conditions;
 - selling non-compliant vapes and e-cigarettes;
 - selling Viagra and Sildenafil without a medical registration from MHRA;
 - selling drug paraphernalia;
 - selling nitrous oxide (known as NOx).
- 2.5 The review application seeks to revoke the premises licence in its entirety.
- 2.6 The review application was advertised in accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 2.7 Each of the Responsible Authorities were consulted in respect of the application.

3.0 RELEVANT REPRESENTATIONS:

- 3.1 **Metropolitan Police** Representation was made in support the review and provides additional information that Mrs Aylin Yengin, the premises licence holder, does not uphold the prevention of crime and disorder licensing objective. A copy of the Police representation can be seen in Annex D.
- 3.2 Other Parties Representations have been made on behalf of the three Southgate ward councillors in support the review, as they believe the review application demonstrates that Mrs Aylin Yengin, the premises licence holder does not support any of the four licensing objectives: the prevention of crime and disorder; public safety; the prevention of public nuisance and protection of children from harm. A copy of the Southgate ward councillors representation can be seen in Annex E.
- 3.3 **Premises Licence Holder** No representation has been made by Mrs Aylin Yengin in response to this review application at the time the report was prepared.

4.0 PROPOSED LICENCE CONDITIONS:

- 4.1 If the Licensing Committee is not minded not to revoke the licence in its entirety, Trading Standards have proposed additional conditions be added to the premises licence.
- 4.2 The premises licence holder, Mrs Aylin Yengin, has not indicated whether those conditions would be agreed.
- 4.2 A copy of the proposed conditions arising from the review application can be seen in Annex F.

5.0 RELEVANT LAW, GUIDANCE & POLICIES:

- 5.1 The paragraphs below are extracted from either:
 - 5.1.1 the Licensing Act 2003 ('Act'); or
 - 5.1.2 the Guidance issued by the Secretary of State to the Home Office of April 2018 ('Guid'); or
 - 5.1.3 the London Borough of Enfield's Licensing Policy Statement of January 2020 ('Pol').

General Principles:

5.2 The Licensing Sub-Committee must carry out its functions with a view to promoting the licensing objectives [Act s.4(1)].

- 5.3The licensing objectives are:
 - 5.3.1 the prevention of crime and disorder;
 - 5.3.2 public safety;
 - 5.3.3the prevention of public nuisance; &
 - 5.3.4the protection of children from harm [Act s.4(2)].
- 5.4 In carrying out its functions, the Sub-Committee must also have regard to:
 - 5.4.1 the Council's licensing policy statement; &
 - 5.4.2 guidance issued by the Secretary of State [Act s.4(3)].

Review:

- 5.5 In reviewing a licence the Licensing Sub-Committee will consider, and take into account, the complaints history of the premises and all other relevant information [Pol s.10.3].
- 5.6 A number of reviews may arise in connection with crime that is not directly connected with licensable activities, for example the sale of contraband goods. The Sub-Committee does not have the power to judge the criminality or otherwise of any issue. The Sub-Committee's role is to ensure the promotion of the crime prevention objective [Guid s.11.24].
- 5.7 There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. These include the use of the premises for the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco and alcohol [Guid s.11.27].
- 5.8 Where reviews arise in respect of these criminal activities and the Sub-Committee determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined, it is expected that revocation of the licence even in the first instance should be seriously considered [Guid s.11.28].

Decision:

- 5.9 Having heard all of the representations (from all parties) the Licensing Sub-Committee must take such steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are :
 - 5.9.1 to modify the conditions of the licence;
 - 5.9.2 to exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence;
 - 5.9.3 to remove the designated premises supervisor
 - 5.9.4 to suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;
 - 5.9.5 to revoke the licence [Act s.52].
- 5.10 In deciding which of these powers to invoke, the Sub-Committee should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns which the representations identify. The remedial action taken should generally be directed at these causes and should generally be directed at those causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response to address the causes of concern that instigated the review. [Guid s.11.20].

This review is primarily based on the prevention of crime and disorder licensing objective. The review application is to revoke the premises licence in its entirety.

1.0 Background:

1.2 On 18/11/2006, LN/200600265 Premises licence was issued to Designated Premises Supervisor Mr Kandasamy Nirmalan on 18/11/2006

1.3 On 11/05/2011, LN/200600265 Premises Licence was issued to Designated
Premises Supervisor and Premises Licence holder Aylin YENGIN -
on 11/05/2011.

1.4 On 06/09/2021, A transfer and variation of Premises licence LN/200600265 was issued to Designated Premises Supervisor- Dervis ALTUN on 06/09/2021. **APPENDIX 1**

1.5 On 12/05/2022, LN/200600265 Premises licence was surrendered on 12/05/2022. Enfield Council's Licensing Department issued a letter of 12/05/2022 addressed to the Owner of Maxi Food & Wine, 38 Chase Side N14 4PA stating that no licensable activity is permitted to take place with immediate effect, for example, the sale of alcohol (off supplies) . **APPENDIX 2**

- 1.5 On 27/05/2022, Aylin Yengin-submitted a Licensing application to transfer premises licence LN/200600265 from Dervis Altun and apply to be a Designated Premises Supervisor pertaining to Maxi Food & Wine, 38 Chase Side N14 4PA. **APPENDIX 3**
- **1.6** On 27/05/2022, Enfield Council's Licensing Department emailed Responsible Authorities notifying them of the Licensing Application to transfer premises licence LN/200600265. **APPENDIX 4**
- **1.7** On 01/06/2022, email from Police Licensing Department stating no representations pertaining to Licensing Application (27/05/2022) to transfer premises licence LN/200600265. **APPENDIX 5**
- **1.8** On 07/06/2022, Enfield Council's Licensing Department emailed variation of premises licence to Designated Premises Supervisor, namely Aylin YENGIN-regarding Maxi Food & Wine- 38 Chase Side N14 4PA. **APPENDIX 6**
- **1.9** On 8/07/2022, Enfield Council conducted a Licensing Enforcement Inspection to Maxi Food & Wine following the surrender of the premises licence LN/200600265 on 12/05/2022. Officers observed alcohol for sale on the retail premises. The Officer spoke to the Owner namely Kemal Altun whom explained that the premises licence LN/200600265 and DPS had been transferred to his wife. Officers also noted that the retail premises were selling drug paraphernalia and viagra tablets. **APPENDIX 7**
- **2.0** On 12/08/2022, LN/200600265 premises licence was suspended on 12/8/2022. However, the annual fee of the afore-mentioned premises licence was paid on 05/09/2022.
- 2.1 Enquiries received by Enfield Council pertaining to Maxi Food & Wine
- **2.2**. On 4/05/2021, Enfield Council's Trading Standards received an enquiry from a member of public pertaining to alleged 24/7 opening hours of Maxi Food & Wine and the sale of Marlboro cigarettes and counterfeit Viagra to consumers. **APPENDIX 7.1**
- **2.3** On 22/12/2022, Enfield Council's Trading Standards Department received an enquiry pertaining to a member of Public alleging the sale of Nitrous Oxide (laughing gas) along with balloons and alcohol to persons under the age of 18 years old. **(APPENDIX 7.2)** The afore-mentioned enquiry was subsequently referred to Enfield Council's Anti-Social Behaviour Department and Licensing Department on 23/12/2021.
- **2.4** On 09/02/2022, Enfield Council's Trading Standards Department issued an advisory letter to Maxi Food & Wine, 38 Chase Side N14 pertaining to age restricted training conducted by the Police 11/02/2022. **(APPENDIX 8)**
- **2.5** On 16/06/2022, Enfield Council received an enquiry via Enfield Council's Neighbourhood liaison Officer alleging the sale of Nitrous Oxide (laughing gas) to persons under the age of 18 years old. **(APPENDIX 8.1)**

- **2.6** On 27/7/2022, Enfield Council's Trading Standards received an enquiry from a member of public pertaining to alleged sale of large cannisters (cream chargers) of nitrous oxide (laughing gas) being stored and/or sold to consumers from Maxi Food & Wine. As a result of the afore-mentioned enquiry, an advisory letter pertaining to the Psychoactive Substances Act 2016, was issued to the Owner of Maxi Food & Wine on 1/08/2022. **(APPENDIX 9)**
- **2.7** On 4/08/2022, Enfield Council's Trading Standards received an enquiry from a member of public pertaining to the alleged sale of cannisters of nitrous oxide (laughing gas) being sold to consumers who after purchasing the nitrous oxide, fall asleep outside the retail premises. **(APPENDIX 9.1)**
- **2.8** On 10/8/2022, the alleged possession of large cannisters of Nitrous Oxide was reported to Enfield Council's Anti-social behaviour Department whom subsequently referred the afore-mentioned to the Police on 19/08/2022 and 16/9/2022, respectively.
- **2.9** On 7/10/2022, Enfield Council's Trading Standards received an enquiry from a member of public alleging the sale of cannisters of nitrous oxide (laughing gas) to persons under the age of 18 years old for recreational use. **(APPENDIX 9.2)**
- **2.9.1** On 11/10/2022, Enfield Council Trading Standards emailed the Anti-Social Behaviour Department and the Police regarding the referral of the sale of nitrous oxide (laughing gas) from Maxi Food & Wine.

3.0 Inspection history

- **3.1** As a result of enquiry 4/5/2021 from a member of Public **(7.1)**, on 27/05/2021 Enfield Council's Licensing Department conducted a Licensing enforcement inspection and identified breaches of Premises Licence conditions 4,7,11 and 12. **(APPENDIX 10)**
- **3.2** As a result of an enquiry received by Enfield Council's Trading Standards Department on 22/12/2021 pertaining to the alleged sale of Nitrous Oxide (laughing gas) along with balloons and alcohol to persons under the age of 18 years old **(2.3).** On 4/01/2022, a warning/advisory letter was issued via post to Dervis Altun DPS of Maxi Food & Wine outlining the requirements of complying with the Psychoactive Substance Act 2016. **(APPENDIX 11)**
- **3.3** On 22/01/2022, Enfield Council's Licensing Enforcement Department conducted a Licensing Enforcement inspection on 22/01/2022. Dilan Karakus signed the inspection sheet of 22/01/2022. Dilan Karakus stated the Owner of Maxi Food & Wine as Aylin YENGIN and the Manager as Metin YENGIN. The Tobacco gantry was open during the inspection and was requested to be closed in accordance with Tobacco Legislation. **(APPENDIX 12)**
- **3.4** Subsequent to the Inspection on 22/01/022, on 24/01/2022, Enfield Council's Licensing Enforcement Department emailed Maxi Food & Wine via email address conveyed during the said inspection. The email requested confirmation of:-
 - who has control of the business Maxi Food & Wine
 - who has day to day control of training staff of alcohol legislation
 - that the premises licence conditions have been complied with and that the tobacco gantry has been fixed/repaired. (APPENDIX 13)

- **3.5** On 24/03/2022, Enfield Council's Trading Standards Department conducted a Vape/E-cigarette compliance inspection to Maxi Food & Wine-38 Chase Side N14 5PA. Approximately 343 non-compliant Vapes/E-cigarettes were seized.
- **3.6** On 31/03/2022, Red Snapper Group conducted a test-purchase of cigarettes on 31/03/2022 on behalf of Enfield Council as part of a national initiative, namely Op Cece, aimed at removing illegal tobacco from retailers within the Borough of Enfield. 2 packets of Marlboro Gold cigarettes were purchased from Maxi Food & Wine-38 Chase Side N14 5PA. The amount of the cigarettes were £7.50 each. **(APPENDIX 14)**
- **3.7** On 04/08/2022, Officers from Enfield Council's Trading Standard Department, a sniffer dog handler and specialist sniffer dogs from Wagtail UK Ltd conducted unannounced inspections to retailers in the borough of Enfield aiming to crackdown the sale/possession of illegal tobacco.

At approximately, 10.43HRS the afore mentioned conducted an inspection to Maxi Food & Wine situated at 38 Chase Side N14 5PA. **APPENDIX 15**

Officers showed their credentials and explained the nature of the inspection to a mature male of Mediterranean appearance whom spoke little English.

A female of Mediterranean appearance was also on the retail premises.

An Officer from Enfield Council requested to speak to the Owner of Maxi Food & Wine. The mature male explained that the Owner was not on the retail premises. The Officer requested that the male telephone the Owner with the aim of explaining the nature of the inspection to the Owner. The Officer spoke to a male via telephone whom identified himself as Ali Kemal YENGIN, Owner of Maxi Food & Wine. Mr YENGIN stated Aylin YENGIN as the Designated Premises Supervisor at the time of the inspection. The Officer explained the nature of the inspection to Mr YENGIN and stated that he would be notified the outcome of the inspection.

During the inspection, Illegal tobacco were found and seized on the retail premises, namely Approx. 50 packets of cigarettes namely: -

Cigarettes

x20 packets of Richmond cigarettes x10 packets of Marlboro Touch cigarettes x5 packets of Minsk cigarettes x10 packets of NZ gold cigarettes x2 packets of Marlboro Red cigarettes x3 packets of Richmond King Size cigarettes

Vapes

X27 Vapeman Solo's

Viagra/Sildenafil

x202 packets of Viagra x15 packets of Sildenafil.

Drug paraphernalia was also displayed for sale at Maxi Food & Wine- 38 Chase Side N14 4PA and large cannisters of nitrous oxide (laughing gas) was also found stored in the storeroom and behind the shop counter.

The Officer subsequently spoke to Ali Kemal YENGIN via telephone and explained the afore-mentioned seizure and the legislation pertaining to nitrous oxide (Laughing gas) was discussed with Ali Kemal YENGIN.

Upon exiting Maxi Food & Wine, Officers observed cannisters of nitrous oxide on the pavement a few feet from Maxi Food & Wine's retail premises.

The illegal tobacco sale conducted on 31/03/2022 and illegal tobacco seizure conducted on 04/08/2022 demonstrates potential breaches of the following premises licence conditions.

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

There are currently no mandatory conditions pertaining to tobacco.

However, it is alleged that Designated Supervisor Aylin (Yingin) YENGIN of Maxi Food & Wine, 38 Chase Side N14 4PA contravened Section 144 Licensing Act 2003 in regard to the possession of imported tobacco without payment of duty or that have otherwise been unlawfully imported and thus breaching the Licensing Objectives of the Premises Licence LN/200600265 namely the Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

- **3.8** On or around 19 h September 2022, Enfield Council sent letters via post to Ahmet Ali Cutci/ Smile Arora and Ali Kemal Yengin/Kemal Altun inviting them to attend PACE interviews at Enfield Council's Civic Centre scheduled for the 11th October 2022. The afore mentioned did not attend the said PACE interviews nor did they contact Enfield Council. **APPENDIX 16**
- **3.9.5** On 20 ^h September 2022, a Pace interview letter was emailed to DPS Aylin Yengin and subsequent emails was received by Enfield Council from Aylin Yengin pertaining to the Pace interview. **APPENDIX 17**

The PACE letters outlined the following alleged contravention of Tobacco legislation:-

Regulation 7(1) of the Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015

On 4th August 2022, Officers seized tobacco products alleged to breach Regulation 7(1) of the Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015, in that the exterior of the packaging did not have the permitted colour, that being Pantone 448c applied to it. Contrary to Regulation 15(1) of the Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015

Tobacco & Related Products Regulations 2016.

On 4th August 2022, Officers seized tobacco products alleged to breach Regulation 7 and 11 of the Tobacco & Related Products Regulations 2016 because the labelling was not in English i.e., did not comply with the General warnings and information messages on tobacco products for smoking and/or General conditions applicable to all health warnings on tobacco products. **Contrary to Regulation 48 of the Tobacco & Related Products Regulations 2016.**

The approximate amount of excise duty and VAT evaded on the 1000 sticks of non-compliant cigarettes is £ 417.43.

Human Medicines Regulations 2012

On 4th August 2022, Officers seized x202 packets of Viagra and x15 packets of Sildenafil as they were alleged to breach Section 12 of the Consumer Protection Act and Human Medicines Regulations 2012.

The afore-mentioned medicines were subsequently referred to the Medicines & Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) on 16/08/2022. On 19/08/2022, the MHRA confirmed that a warning letter would be issued to Maxi Food & Wine-38 Chase Side N14 4PA in regard to the seized medicines.

- **3.9** On 08/08/2022, Enfield Council's Licensing Department issued a letter to Aylin YENGIN regarding the suspension of premises licence due to non-payment. **APPENDIX 18**
- **3.9.1** On or around 30/09/2022, Enfield Council's Licensing Department issued variation of premises licence issued to Aylin YENGIN. **APPENDIX 19**
- **3.9.2** On 03/09/2022, Officers from Enfield Council conducted a Licensing Enforcement inspection whereby proof of payment of annual licensing fee was ascertained pertaining to payment of premises licence regarding Maxi Food & Wine, 38 Chase Side N14 4PA. **APPENDIX 20**

During the inspection, Aylin Yengin stated that their name should be spelt as Yingin and not Yengin. However, companies house states the previous Company Director of Yengin Ltd as Aylin Yengin, of 38 Chase Side N14 NPA. Companies House states Aylin Yengin was appointed as Company Director of Yengin Ltd on 26/09/2018 and resigned as Company Director of Yengin Ltd on 10/02/2021.

Aylin Yengin is also the current Company Director of Maxi Store Ltd company no: 11653801 from 01/11/2018, Registered Office address: 38a Chase Side, London N14 4PA and the current business rates payer of Maxi Wine Centre-495 Hertford Rd EN3 that also had a seizure of illegal tobacco during an Op Cece Tobacco enforcement session conducted 17/02/2022.

- **3.9.3** Aylin Yengin did not attend a formal interview in accordance with the Police and Criminal Evidence Act (PACE) pertaining to the afore-mentioned seizure. However, on 02/06/2022, Aylin Yengin emailed Enfield Council a receipt of 10/03/2022 pertaining to genuine tobacco that was returned to Maxi Wine Centre, 495 Hertford Rd EN3, confirming connection with Maxi Wine Centre. **(APPENDIX 21)**
- **3.9.6** On 30 h September 2022, Enfield Council conducted a Licensing enforcement inspection to Maxi Food & Wine, 38 Chase Side. Hakan Dabak identified as the person in charge of Maxi Food & Wine during the inspection and indicated that the Premises Licence Holder/Designated Premises Supervisor was normally at the retail premises. However, Hakan Dabak explained that the DPS was giving birth at the time of the inspection. 40 boxes of Nitrous oxide (laughing gas) were stored at Maxi Food & Wine as was drug paraphernalia. **(APPENDIX 22)**

The following breaches of the premises licence were identified during the said inspection and outlined within the Inspection sheet: -

Annex 1 Mandatory Conditions: -

1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.

Designated Premises Supervisor was not on retail premises at time of Licensing inspection.

3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

Designated Premises Supervisor was not on retail premises at time of Licensing inspection

Annex 2 mandatory Conditions

4. All staff shall be trained, and re-trained every six months, with regard to the sale of alcohol

No staff training records seen during inspection

7. The 'Challenge 21' proof-of-age scheme shall be operated at the premises.

No 'Challenge 25' stickers/posters seen during the inspection

 A Central Station Alarm system shall be installed, operated and maintained at the premises. The system shall comply with EU50131 and shall include a panic button facility

No Alarm information available during inspection

11. A prominent, clear and legible notice shall be displayed at the exit requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly

No 'Leave quietly' signs/posters seen during the inspection

12. There shall be displayed, on the exit doors and immediately inside the premises, a sign stating 'you are entering a drinking control area and no open alcoholic drinks are to be taken off the premises

No drinking prohibition signs seen during the inspection

The inspection sheet outlined Maxi Food & Wine stated 14 days from 30.09.2022 to comply with the afore-mentioned licensing conditions.

4.0 Additional Information:

- **4.1** Home Office revised guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 (April 2018) (11.27), states that there are certain criminal activities that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. The list includes the use of licensed premises for the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco and alcohol (i.e., non-duty paid products).
- **4.2** The guidance (11.28) goes on to say that it is envisaged that responsible authorities will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence even in the first instance should be seriously considered.

5.0 Conclusion:

Non-UK Duty paid illegal tobacco is known to be an activity conducted by Organised Crime, it is important that any identified illegal tobacco is removed from the market. From a Public Health perspective 80,000 deaths in England are a result of smoking illnesses and illegal tobacco/cigarettes are known to be smuggled into the UK to be sold for high profit margins with blatant disregard to compliance with product safety legislation.

Having regard Enfield Council's Tobacco Control Strategy that implements Central Government's Public Health Agenda, Enfield Council's Trading Standards Authority is of the opinion that taking into consideration: -

- The alleged sale of non-compliant cigarettes, namely 2 packets of Marlboro Gold cigarettes on 31.03.2022
- The seizure of approximately 343 non-compliant Vapes/e-cigarettes on 24.03.2022.
- The seizure of packets of 1000 sticks of non-duty paid cigarettes and 27 non-compliant E-cigarettes/Vapes that were seized from Maxi Food & Wine on 17.2.2022

It is therefore appropriate to recommend that this licence be revoked, (even in the first instance).

If the Licensing Committee is minded not to revoke the licence, then Enfield Council's Trading Standards Authority requests that the licence be suspended until the following actions have been completed:

5.1.1 Full compliance with the licence conditions has been demonstrated.

5.2 Trading Standards make the following recommendations regarding amendments to the licence conditions: -

- Non-duty paid tobacco or alcohol must not be stored or sold from the premises or from any motor-vehicle.
- A 'Think 25' proof of age scheme shall be operated and relevant material shall be displayed at the premises.
- A written record of refused sales shall be kept on the premises and completed when necessary. This record shall be made available to Police and/or the Local Authority upon request and shall be kept for at least one year from the date of the last entry.
- Signs shall be prominently displayed on the exit doors advising customers that
 the premises is in a Public Space Protection Order Area (or similar) and that
 alcohol should not be taken off the premises and consumed in the street.
 These notices shall be positioned at eye level and in a location where they
 can be read by those leaving the premises.
- Only the Premises Licence Holder or Designated Premises Supervisor shall purchase alcohol and / or tobacco stock.
- Alcohol and tobacco stock shall only be purchased from registered wholesalers.
- The premises licence holder shall ensure that all receipts for goods bought are kept together in a file or folder as evidence that they have been brought into the UK through legal channels. Receipts shall show the following details: (1) Seller's name and address; (2) Seller's company details, if applicable; (3) Seller's VAT details, if applicable. Copies of these documents shall be retained for no less than 12 months and shall be made available to police or authorised officers of the council on request within five working days of the request. The most recent three months' worth of receipts shall be kept on the premises and made available to the police or authorised officers of the council on request.
- All tobacco products that are not on the tobacco display shall be stored in a container clearly marked 'Tobacco Stock'. This container shall be kept within the storeroom or behind the sales counter.
- Tobacco products shall only be taken from the tobacco display behind the sales counter to make a sale.
- No Nitrous oxide (laughing gas) should be stored or sold to consumers
 whereby it is reasonable for the retailer to know that the Nitrous Oxide would
 be misused by the consumer or to any persons under the age of 18 years old.



You must ensure that the operation of the licensed premises complies with these Mandatory Conditions, as well as the Conditions stated in Annex 2 and Annex 3 (if applicable). Failure to do this can lead to prosecution or review of the licence.

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner:
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either -

- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that -
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures -
- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8 (i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- (ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D + (DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Supply of alcohol under a Club Premises Certificate

The mandatory conditions 4 to 8 above will apply. If the club premises certificate authorises the supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises, the following three mandatory conditions must also be included:

- 1. The supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises must be made at a time when the premises are open for the purposes of supplying alcohol to members of the club for consumption on the premises.
- 2. Any alcohol supplied for consumption off the premises must be in a sealed container.
- 3. Any alcohol supplied for consumption off the premises must be made to a member of the club in person.

Supply of alcohol from community premises

The following mandatory condition will replace the first three mandatory conditions above when an application is made for a premises licence by the management committee of community premises and the licensing authority also grants an application for this alternative licence condition to be included in the licence:

1. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by the [management committee / management board / board of trustees].

Mandatory condition when a premises licence or a club premises certificate authorises the exhibition of films

9. Admission of children to the premises must be restricted in accordance with the film classification recommended by the British Board of Film Classification or recommended by this licensing authority as appropriate.

Mandatory Condition relating to door supervision which only applies where a premises licence includes a condition that one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity

10. All persons guarding premises against unauthorised access or occupation or against outbreaks of disorder or against damage (door supervisors) must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this in one of two ways: 1) by providing with application copies or scanned copies of the documents listed below (which do not need to be certified), or 2) by providing their 'share code' to enable the licensing authority to carry out a check using the Home Office online right to work checking service (see below).

- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or residence.
- A **current** Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, **less than 6 months old**, issued by the Home Office under regulation 18(3) or 20(2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2016, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in the UK including:-
 - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,
 - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
 - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
 - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
 - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
 - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or
 - (iv) self-sufficient e.g. bank statements.

As an alternative to providing a copy of the documents listed above, applicants may demonstrate their right to work by allowing the licensing authority to carry out a check with the Home Office online right to work checking service.

To demonstrate their right to work via the Home Office online right to work checking service, applicants should include in this application their 9-digit share code (provided to them upon accessing the service at https://www.gov.uk/prove-right-to-work) which, along with the applicant's date of birth (provided within this application), will allow the licensing authority to carry out the check.



- 6. Youths shall be discouraged from loitering outside the premises.
- 7. The 'Challenge 21' proof-of-age scheme shall be operated at the premises.
- 8. A CCTV system shall be installed, operated and maintained at the premises. The system shall conform to the Data Protection Act guidelines. Cameras shall monitor the front entrance doors, till area, alcohol displays and the outside of the premises. The time and date shall be generated onto recordings, which shall be of a quality to satisfy the Police and which shall be retained for a minimum of 31 days.
- 9. A Central Station Alarm system shall be installed, operated and maintained at the premises. The system shall comply with EU50131 and shall include a panic button facility.
- 10. Unaccompanied children under 14 are not allowed to enter the premises after 21:00.
- 11. A prominent, clear and legible notice shall be displayed at the exit requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
- 12. There shall be displayed, on the exit doors and immediately inside the premises, a sign stating 'you are entering a drinking control area and no open alcoholic drinks are to be taken off the premises'.

Annex 1 – Mandatory Conditions

Mandatory conditions where the licence authorises the sale of alcohol (Note: Conditions 4, 5, and 7 relate to on-sales only)

These Mandatory Conditions form part of the Operating Schedule of your licence. You must ensure that the operation of the licensed premises complies with these Mandatory Conditions, as well as the Conditions stated in Annex 2 and Annex 3 (if applicable). Failure to do this can lead to prosecution or review of the licence.

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner:
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either -

- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.

7. The responsible person must ensure that –

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures -

(i) beer or cider: ½ pint;

(ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

(iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;

- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8 (i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- (ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence:
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Supply of alcohol under a Club Premises Certificate

The mandatory conditions 4 to 8 above will apply. If the club premises certificate authorises the supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises, the following three mandatory conditions must also be included:

- 1. The supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises must be made at a time when the premises are open for the purposes of supplying alcohol to members of the club for consumption on the premises.
- 2. Any alcohol supplied for consumption off the premises must be in a sealed container.
- 3. Any alcohol supplied for consumption off the premises must be made to a member of the club in person.

Supply of alcohol from community premises

The following mandatory condition will replace the first three mandatory conditions above when an application is made for a premises licence by the management committee of community premises and the licensing authority also grants an application for this alternative licence condition to be included in the licence:

1. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by the [management committee / management board / board of trustees].

9. Admission of children to the premises must be restricted in accordance with the film classification recommended by the British Board of Film Classification or recommended by this licensing authority as appropriate.

There are laws that restrict the sale of certain products and services to underage people

This guide introduces you to these age-restricted products and services and the minimum age of the young people you can legally sell them to.

You will also find essential information on what you can do to prevent the sale of age-restricted products and services to underage people and stay on the right side of the law.

Minimum legal age

There are many laws that deal with the sale of age-restricted products and services. Some products such as alcohol and fireworks require you to obtain a licence before you can legally sell them.

To help you to work out which laws you need to comply with, first check the table below to see if there are any products or services you sell or intend to sell that are age restricted and what the age restriction is. Most products have corresponding In-depth Guides in which you can find out more information (see below).

Taking steps to prevent underage sales

If you sell age-restricted products to a person under the minimum legal age, you may commit an offence under the relevant law. The penalties can include a fine or even imprisonment. There are laws that give you a legal defence, which is often referred to as the 'due diligence' defence.

Basically you must prove that you took 'all reasonable precautions / all reasonable steps' and exercised 'all due diligence' to avoid committing an offence.

This means that you are responsible for making sure that you and your staff do not sell age-restricted products to people under the minimum legal age. You can do this by setting up effective systems within your business.

These systems should be regularly monitored and updated as necessary to identify and put right any problems or weaknesses, or to keep pace with any advances in technology.

Key best-practice features of an effective system include:

- age verification checks. Verify the age of potential buyers by asking to see an identity card that
 bears the PASS hologram (the Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS) is the UK's national proof-ofage accreditation scheme supported by the Home Office, the Scottish Government, the Association
 of Chief Police Officers (ACPO), Police Scotland and the Chartered Trading Standards Institute (CTSI).
 The Scottish Government also endorses the Young Scot card
- Challenge 21 / Challenge 25. In England and Wales you can participate or must participate as a licensing condition if you sell alcohol in a scheme to carry out age verification checks on anyone who looks younger than 21 or 25. When selling alcohol, tobacco or nicotine vapour products in Scotland it is a legal requirement to check the age of any customer who appears to be under 25
- **staff training.** Make sure your staff receive adequate training on underage sales. Keep a training record and make sure the training is regularly updated
- **use of till prompts.** You can use prompts that appear on the till when an age-restricted product is scanned to remind staff to carry out age verification checks
- **store layout, signage and CCTV.** Keep your age-restricted products where they can be monitored by staff. For example, fireworks stored on the shop floor must by law be kept in a secure cabinet. Ensure you have adequate signs to inform consumers of the minimum legal age to purchase. You are legally required to display notices for tobacco and fireworks
- **keep and maintain a refusals register.** This means keeping a record (date, time, incident, description of potential buyer) where sales of age-restricted products have been refused. This helps to demonstrate that you actively refuse sales and have an effective system in place

Enfield Council has received an enquiry alleging the sale of nitrous oxide (laughing gas) i.e cream chargers in large cans, have taken place from your premises.

This letter provides a summary of the legislation regarding the sale of nitrous oxide to customers of any age (e.g. Persons under the age of 18 years old) and some suggestions of how to prevent illegal sales of Nitrous oxide.

Nitrous oxide (N2O) is a colourless sweet-tasting gas often referred to as 'laughing gas'.

Nitrous oxide has several legitimate uses in medicine and dentistry. It is also used as a fuel additive and as a component of rocket fuel and is sold as an aerosol spray propellant within whipped cream canisters.

Products include small canisters in large packs, each enough for a recreational dose, and paraphernalia such as 'creamers' or 'crackers'. These dispense the gas from canisters into balloons, that are used to inhale the gas.

Retailers should pay particular attention to the potential for abuse of nitrous oxide, especially where customers seek to buy in bulk or large volumes.

It is a criminal offence for Retailers to sell nitrous oxide to customers of any age where the retailer knows or is reckless about whether the psychoactive substance (e.g. nitrous oxide) is likely to be consumed by the person to whom it is supplied (e.g. persons under the age of 18 years old), or by some other person, for its psychoactive effects. If prosecuted, you may be fined.

How to prevent selling Nitrous Oxide

A retailer should take reasonable steps to make sure they are aware of the potential uses of psychoactive substances products such as Nitrous Oxide.

- warning signs in store or on products themselves
- training to help staff assess the likelihood that products are being bought for their psychoactive effect
- updating training and age-restriction policies (young people are considered to be a particular risk group)
- Limiting quantities of substances to be sold in one purchase
- Is the product being psychoactive substances product purchased known to be misused
- · What are the circumstances of the sale, e.g. quantity and time of day
- Consider whether the customer is a repeat purchaser of the psychoactive substance product e.g. (nitrous oxide).
- Consider whether the customer is known for psychoactive consumption. For example, someone buying industrial cleaner on a weekday alongside other household goods differs to young people buying nitrous oxide canisters late on a weekend.
- Staff at the point of sale should consider whether it's likely that a product is being purchased on behalf of another person (by proxy).

Enforcement Trading Standards ask persons under the age of 18 to attempt to buy age restricted products from businesses to check they are abiding by the legislation. Please be advised that the volunteer may also lie about their age, the purpose is to ensure the seller asks for photographic identification.

Sale of Illegal Tobacco/Cigarettes- The Tobacco and Related Products Regulations 2016, The Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015, Trade Marks Act 1994

As a business you must buy all tobacco, alcohol and any other products that belong to a registered brand (trade mark) holder from a reputable supplier. The purchase of these products must be "traceable" and should be evidenced by documentation/ receipts that must be available for inspection upon request.

All tobacco products must also comply with The Tobacco and Related Products Regulations 2016 and The Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015.

The Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015 prohibits the sale of individual single cigarettes and states that a unit packet of cigarettes must contain a minimum of 20 cigarettes.

If smuggled goods are discovered in licensed premises or vehicles associated with a licensed premise, may result in the Licensing Authority taking action to have the premises licence permanently revoked.

Businesses may also face prosecution for breaches of the afore-mentioned legislation.

Officers may visit your business premises namely, Maxi Food & Wine, 38 Chase Side, London, N14 5PA to investigate this allegation. If the allegation is verified and breaches of Tobacco legislation are found, then you are at risk of being prosecuted and fined.

Licensing Act 2003- Sale of Alcohol to persons under the age of 18 years old

- It is a criminal offence to sell alcohol to a person under the age of eighteen, which if prosecuted you may be fined.
- A sale may result in several people in the business committing an offence.
 The seller, a 'Designated Premises Supervisor', and the owner of the business may all face prosecution.
- The licence may be revoked by a Responsibility Authority and/or resident may also seek to review the licence.
- When the Council's Licensing Sub-Committee review an application, they may:
 - o revoke the licence: suspend the licence for up to three months;
 - o remove the DPS from the licence: exclude a licensable activity from the licence: and / or change the licence conditions.

How to avoid selling age-restricted products to persons underage:

- Ensure you have a suitable proof of age scheme for example "Think 25".
- Ensure you record refused sales in a refusal book or diary, kept by the till or electronically. And complete every time a sale of alcohol is refused.
- Acceptable proof of age cards contain the PASS (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
 hologram that guarantees the card is authentic. Others include, Citizen Card,
 Validate UK and the Portman Card. Passports and Photo-card Driving licences.

- An EPoS (Electronic Point of Sale) system, can remind staff via a prompt.
- Display posters showing age limits in the sales area that may deter potential purchasers and act as a reminder to staff. And in staff areas, with the potential consequences of selling alcohol to children.
- New and existing staff are properly trained and are regularly reminded about the legislation. Keep records of when the training was carried out.
- Ensure staff know how to refuse underage sales and are confident when asking for photo identification if there is doubt about the person's age. You might want to consider taking a 'no ID, no sale' approach to age-restricted products.
- The person monitoring the refusals book should sign and date when their checks have been made. This will help to demonstrate that it is being monitored and used properly.

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Information For Staff – Off Licensed Premises

This training resource pack has been designed to assist those working in premises that are licensed to sell alcohol for consumption off the premises.

Although designed for licensed premises, much of the information contained in the pack can be used by premises that are not licensed to sell alcohol but sell other age restricted goods such as cigarettes, knives etc.

If used correctly, the pack should enable staff to be aware of the law in relation to age restricted products and how to avoid making illegal sales. The pack also offers advice on how to prevent breaching conditions attached to the premises licence.

It is recommended that owners, managers, Designated Premises Supervisors, Premises Licence Holders, employees and any other person who helps in the business reads this guidance. The tick boxes beside the guidance will help identify the areas that require more attention.

A test that staff can take to check their understanding of the training is attached at Appendix A.

In addition to this pack, the Licensing Enforcement Team has provided a Training Record Book in which training sessions can be recorded, and a Refusals Book in which to list refused sales.

Summary of Responsibilities

1. Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS)

- Under the Licensing Act 2003 it is a mandatory condition that where a
 premises licence authorises the sale of alcohol there must be a
 Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) and that no sale of alcohol may be
 made at a time when there is no DPS in respect of the licence.
- The only exception is for premises that are or form part of a church hall, chapel hall or other similar buildings; or a village hall, parish hall or community hall or other similar building. In order for the exception to apply the applicant must successfully apply to disapply the usual mandatory conditions.
- The DPS must be a personal licence holder. This ensures that where alcohol is sold, there is a person at the premises who has a relevant qualification and therefore an understanding of the social issues and potential problems linked with the sale of alcohol.
- There can be any number of personal licence holders working at a premises but only one can be named on the premises licence as the DPS.
- Only an individual can be the DPS and not a corporate body.
- The DPS must be appointed by the Premises Licence Holder and can be the Premises Licence Holder themselves if they are an individual and hold a personal licence. However, as the positions of DPS is one of responsibility the named individual must give their consent to become the DPS.
- Guidance recommends that the DPS is the individual who has day to day control and responsibility for running the premises.
- The DPS is responsible for alcohol sales and therefore also responsible for any offences relating to alcohol sales.
- The name and contact details of the DPS are stated on Part B of the Premises Licence. It is a legal requirement to display Part B at the premises. This allows Officers to easily identify who is in charge and ensure any problems that arise can be dealt with swiftly by engaging with this key individual.
- The DPS need not be on the premises at all times. They must however be able to ensure that the licensing objectives are properly promoted and that the licensing law and licence conditions are complied with.



- The Police are the only responsible authority that can object to the nomination of a certain person as DPS and only in exceptional circumstances where they believe the appointment would undermine the crime prevention objective.
- A person only ceases to be DPS if an application is made and granted to vary the DPS or the DPS informs the licensing authority in writing that they are no longer the DPS of the premises.
- It is best practice for the DPS to leave a list of named persons who they have authorised to sell alcohol on the premises. This list should be kept by the till so it can easily be produced if requested by an officer from the police or local authority. This list should be signed and dated by the DPS.

2. Premises Licence Holder

- A Premises Licence Holder is any individual (aged at least 18) or body who carries on a business involving licensable activities on a premises.
- A Premises Licence Holder must ensure that a DPS is in place if the premises supplies alcohol.
- The Premises Licence Holder must ensure that the premises licence conditions are complied with and that the permitted licensable activities are carried out within the limitations set.



General Advice

In order to prevent illegal sales being made from your premises, the Licensing Enforcement Team recommend that you ensure:

•	Staff are encouraged to take a 'No ID, No Sale' approach to age-restricted products, or use the "Think 25" Policy. The Think 25 Policy involves the trader refusing to sell age restricted products to anyone who appears to be under 25 years old, and does not have an acceptable form of identification.	
•	Staff know the importance of looking at the face of every customer: not all children are short!	
•	Staff exercise their rights to refuse to sell an item if they have concerns about its use.	
•	You have a method of recording refused sales for example a "Refusal Book" or "diary." This should be kept at the point of sale, or recorded electronically on the till, and should be completed following each refused sale. A record should be made of the time, date, description of the young person, the product they attempted to purchase, and the reason for the refusal.	



•	The Refusals Book is monitored weekly to check for patterns in the times or days the sales are refused and whether all staff are using the book. This information may be useful when organising staff rotas as more staff may be needed at certain times.	
•	The person monitoring the Refusals Book signs and dates the book when they check it. Notes should also be made if any action is taken following the checks. This will help to demonstrate that the book is being monitored and used properly.	
•	Staff do not sell age restricted products to anyone suspected of buying on behalf of an under age person. Staff do not sell alcohol to anyone who appears to be drunk or to a uniformed police officer.

•	Posters are displayed near the till stating the age limits for different products. This may put off potential purchasers and will act as a reminder to staff. Test Purchases

• Staff are aware that underage volunteers carry out regular test purchases of age restricted products, on behalf of Trading Standards and sales can lead to prosecutions, large fines, a criminal record and a review of the premises licence. Volunteers may lie about their age.

Please note:

If an underage sale is made, it is worth noting that if you are not the actual seller, and you have done all you reasonably can in an attempt to prevent underage sales from your premises, you may be able to raise a due diligence defence* and avoid action being taken against you and a possible criminal conviction. Giving this training to all staff/helpers as an induction and regular refresher training, will contribute to establishing a defence.

If you suspect any premises of making illegal sales of age restricted goods, or are in breach of their premises licence e.g. trading outside of their licensed hours, please inform the Licensing Enforcement Team on 0208 379 3856, or email trading.standards@enfield.gov.uk.

*Definition of due diligence defence: the accused took all reasonable and practical steps to avoid committing the offence.



Legal Requirements Summary

Alcohol

- It is a criminal offence to sell alcohol to a person under the age of 18, even
 if they look older.
- It is a criminal offence to sell liqueur chocolates to anyone under the age of 16, even if they look older.
- Staff under the age of 18 must not sell alcohol without the consent of an employee over 18. Consent is required each time a sale is made.
- Selling alcohol to a person under 18 puts the premises licence at risk of review, which could result in the licence being amended, suspended or revoked and/or the DPS being removed from the licence.
- Underage sales can result in a number of people in the business committing an offence. The seller, a personal licence holder, the premises licence holder, the DPS and the owner of the business may all face prosecution.
- The maximum fine for selling alcohol to someone under 18 is a £10,000 per offence and/or up to 6 months imprisonment. The court can also order that the personal licence is taken away from any personal licence holders involved.
- Alcohol is defined under the Licensing Act 2003 as being a strength of 0.5% alcohol by volume (ABV) or above, and therefore the 18 age restriction applies to all products containing this ABV.
- It is a mandatory condition of the Licensing Act 2003, that where the supply of alcohol is one of the licensable activities, there must be a DPS named on the license.
- Every supply of alcohol must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence. It is recommended that the DPS gives written authorisation to all staff who sell alcohol.
- If the DPS no longer works at the premises, they themselves must inform Enfield Council Licensing Team in writing that they are no longer the DPS for the premises. If this is done, the premises cannot sell alcohol until a replacement DPS has been approved and the new licence has been issued.



'Off' Sales means the alcohol is to be consumed off the premises. Staff
must not open alcohol for customers or let them consume it inside the
premises.

Cigarette & Tobacco Products

- The Children and Young Persons Act 1933 states that it is a criminal offence to sell tobacco products to a person under the age of 18, even if they look older.
- From 1st October 2007 the age limit for the sale of tobacco products changed from 16 to 18.
- An underage sale may result in a number of people in the business committing an offence. The seller and the owner of the business may both face prosecution.
- The maximum fine for breaching the law is £5,000 per offence.
- Tobacco products include cigarettes, cigars, loose tobacco, shisha, etc.
- It is illegal to break open a packet of cigarettes or cigars and sell them as singles.
- If tobacco is available for sale, a notice must be displayed stating; "IT IS ILLEGAL TO SELL TOBACCO PRODUCTS TO ANYONE UNDER THE AGE OF 18". The size of this warning must not be less than 297 mm x 420 mm, and the characters no less than 36 mm high.
- The tobacco warning must be clear, visible and prominent. It is recommended that it is displayed in close proximity to the till and tobacco display.
- All tobacco products must display the statutory health warning in English.
- All tobacco products must be UK duty paid.



Knives

- The Criminal Justices Act 1988 states that it is a criminal offence to sell knives to a person under the age of 18, even if they look older.
- From 1st October 2007 the age limit for the sale of knives changed from 16 to 18.
- The law applies to any knife, knife blade, razor blade, axe or any item that has a blade or is sharply pointed and could be considered a weapon.
- The only exceptions are folding pocket knives with a blade of 3 inches
 or less and <u>enclosed</u> razor blades (e.g. shaving blades mounted in plastic
 casing) these do not have a legal age restriction, however, we
 recommend that you apply the 18 age limit to all blades, to be on the safe
 side.
- The maximum fine for selling a knife/knives/blade etc to anyone under the age of 18 is £5,000, and up to six months imprisonment.
- A sale may result in a number of people in the business committing an offence. The seller and the owner of the business may both face prosecution.
- Always question a young person as to what the knife is going to be used for.

Spraypaints/Aerosols

- The Anti-Social Behaviour Act 2003 states that it is a criminal offence to sell spraypaints/aerosols to a person under the age of 16, even if they look older.
- A sale may result in a number of people in the business committing an offence. The seller and the owner of the business may all face prosecution.
- The maximum fine for breaching the law is £5,000 per offence.



Cigarette Lighter Refills

- The Cigarette Lighter Refill (Safety) Regulations 1999, by virtue of the Consumer Protection Act 1987 states that it is a criminal offence to sell cigarette lighter refills to a person under the age of 18, even if they look older.
- A sale may result in a number of people in the business committing an offence. The seller and the owner of the business may both face prosecution.
- The maximum fine for breaching the law is £5,000 per offence.
- If you suspect that an older person is buying on behalf of someone under 18 to inhale, "get high" or sniff, refuse the sale.

Fireworks

The Pyrotechnic Articles (Safety) Regulations 2010 states that it is a criminal offence to sell fireworks to a person under the age of 18, even if they look older.

- It is also an offence to sell caps, cracker snaps, party poppers, throwdowns, novelty matches etc. to anyone under 16, even if they look older.
- A sale may result in a number of people in the business committing an offence. The seller and the owner of the business may both face prosecution.
- The maximum fine for breaching the law is £5,000 per offence.
- You must be registered with Enfield Council Trading Standards & Licensing to keep fireworks on your premises.



Videos & DVDs

- The Video Recordings Act 1984 states that it is a criminal offence to sell DVDs/videos/videogames to a person who has not attained the age specified in the classification, even if they look older.
- A sale may result in a number of people in the business committing an offence. The seller and the owner of the business may both face prosecution.
- The maximum fine for breaching the law is £5,000 per offence.
- It is illegal to supply a video recording without the correct age classification labelling, as stipulated by the BBFC (British Board of Film Classification).
- It is illegal to make, sell or supply DVDs/videogames that have been copied without the owner's rights, for example pirate copies or counterfeits.
- The categories of "video" recording certificates are as follows:

Uc	Particularly suitable for very young children. Can be supplied to anyone.								
U	Universal – suitable for all								
PG	Parental Guidance. Some scenes may be unsuitable for young								
	children. Can be supplied to anyone.								
12	Suitable for those aged 12 and over.								
15	Suitable for those aged 15 and over.								
18	Suitable for those aged 18 and over.								
R18	Restricted – to be supplied only in licensed sex shops to persons of								
	not less than 18 years. NB. No premises in the borough of Enfield								
	have obtained such a licence.								

Lottery Tickets & Scratch Cards

- It is illegal to sell lottery tickets / scratch cards to a person under the age of 16.
- It is illegal for members of staff under the age of 16 to sell lottery tickets/scratch cards.



Adult Magazines

- Magazines that carry an age warning must only be sold to those who are over the stated age.
- Adult magazines must only be displayed on shelves above adult eye level.
- Any such displays should be out of view of people passing on the street.
- A notice about the age restriction of these products should be displayed near them.

Petrol

- It is illegal to sell petrol to those under the age of 16.
- Always be extra vigilant when small volume sales are made.



Additional Information for Licensed Premises

Mandatory Conditions

You must ensure that the operation of the premises complies with the all the conditions set out in the licence/certificate document as well as the mandatory conditions

Supply of Alcohol

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
 - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

The following additional conditions came into force in October 2010:

You must ensure that the operation of the premises, under the licence / certificate, *also* complies with these Mandatory Conditions, even though they are *not* printed on your licence/certificate document.

- 1
- (1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children –
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the



period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act):
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
- (d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on
 - (i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
 - (ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
- (e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- 2. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 3. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 4. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.
- 5. The responsible person shall ensure that-
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—



- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
- (b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.
- NB. The "responsible person" means-
- (a) in relation to licensed premises-
 - (i) the holder of a premises licence in respect of the premises,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) under such a licence, or
 - (iii) any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised for the purposes of
 - this section by such a holder or supervisor,
- (b) in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables him to prevent the supply in question.

Suspension of Licence Non Payment of Annual Fees

Annual fees must be paid promptly when due. As of 25th April 2012 if annual fees are not paid, the licence is suspended 21 days after the payment due date. The licence remains suspended until the fee is paid. Trading while a licence is suspended is an offence and can lead to prosecution.

Cumulative Impact Area Policy - CIP

As a result of concerns and evidence about alcohol related crime and disorder and public nuisance Enfield Council consulted on and introduced a Cumulative Impact Area Policy (CIP) in April 2012.

The CIP relates to all new and variation applications submitted and specifies suitable core hours that should not be exceeded for each type of premises.

The four areas covered by the CIP are:

Enfield Town
Enfield Highway
Edmonton
Southgate

If an application is submitted with hours that exceed the policy there is a presumption that the application will be refused unless the applicant can



demonstrate that there will be no negative cumulative impact on the licensing objectives.

Please be aware that it is for the applicant to demonstrate that there will be no negative impact on the licensing objectives, not for responsible authorities to prove that there will be, the emphasis is on the applicant.

More information about the CIP can be found in the council licensing policy statement.

Change of Address Details on a Premises Licence

If a Premises Licence Holder or DPS has changed their name or home address then the premises licence holder legally must inform the Licensing Team of this information in writing.

The letter must include the following:

- Name and address of the premises
- Licence number
- · Which information has changed and what the new details are
- Enclose £10.50 (Cheques payable to London Borough of Enfield)
- Enclose the licence that needs updating or state in the letter why you cannot do so.

Failure to comply is an offence under Section 33 of the Licensing Act 2003 which carries a maximum fine of £500.

Change of Address Details on a Personal Licence

If a Personal Licence Holder has changed their name or home address then the personal licence holder legally must inform the Licensing Team of this information in writing.

The letter must include the following:

- Name and address of the individual
- Licence number
- Which information has changed and what the new details are
- Enclose £10.50
- Enclose only the paper copy of the personal licence or state in the letter why you cannot do so.



The letter should be sent to the Licensing Team of the borough that issued the Personal Licence.

Failure to comply is an offence under Section 127 of the Licensing Act 2003 which carries a maximum fine of £500.

You may also wish to train staff in:

- How to avoid trips and slips
- How to lift heavy objects
- Electrical safety
- How to report an incident
- How to report an accident
- How to identify counterfeit goods/bank notes
- Basic food hygiene
- Dealing with violence/Anti-social behaviour

- Health & Safety Policies

TRAINING RECORD BOOK: GUIDANCE

- The Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) should have day-to-day control over the sale of alcohol at the premises, and it is recommended that as a personal licence holder they should carry out the training relating to alcohol sales.
- New and existing staff should be sufficiently trained and aware of all legal requirements relating to your business as well as the times and conditions of the premises licence.
- Refresher training should be carried out at least every 3 months. NB. Check conditions on the premises licence in case this is required more
- Staff should be kept up to date with products sold and the age restrictions that apply.
- Records of all training should be made and maintained; including details of what training was carried out, when and with whom.
- Training records should be kept for a minimum of 12 months, in a secure place on the premises, and be made available upon request by the local authority or Police. NB. Check your conditions of your premises licence - it may state a different period of time that you must keep records for.
- Those receiving training should sign the training records to confirm that they have received and understood the training.
- If any offences under the Licensing Act 2003 are committed, you may be able to raise a due diligence defence* and avoid action being taken against you, and a possible criminal conviction. Giving and recording training to all staff/helpers as an induction and regular refresher training, may contribute to establishing a defence.

*Definition of due diligence defence: the accused took all reasonable and practical steps to avoid committing the offence.

I am the above named person and on Monday 31st March 2022 I was tasked with conducting Test Purchases across Enfield on behalf of London Trading Standards. My role was to enter Maxi Food and Wine, Chase Side N14 5PA to purchase illicit tobacco. I would then leave the premises and ensure illicit items purchased are secured in an exhibit bag.

I visited a number of premises attempting to purchase illicit cigarettes or tobacco as instructed and was accompanied by a Red Snapper Managed Services Consultant – who was the Test Purchasing Support Officer for this operation. I was provided with test purchasing money prior to entering each premises.

At 1242 hours on 31/03/22 I entered Maxi Food and Wine, Chase Side N14 5PA and approached an Arabic male in the shop near the front counter. I would describe this man as appearing in his 50's, medium build approximately height 5 feet 8 or 5 feet 9 inches tall wearing dark clothing and was clean shaven. I will refer to him as MALE 1.

I asked MALE 1 for 2 x packet of cheap Marlboro Gold Cigarettes. MALE 1 disappeared in between the high shelving towards the rear of the shop floor and could not see exactly where he went and then he reappeared some moments later, about 3 to 4 minutes later with the Cigarettes. MALE 1 handed the Cigarettes to me and said that they were £7.50 each per packet and that I would have to pay the shop assistant at the counter. I would describe her as an Indian female with long dark black hair, appearing to be in her 20's.

I approached the counter and noticed a light skinned Arabic female. I would describe her as being in her 20's, large build with shoulder length dark curly hair. I will refer to her as FEMALE 1. FEMALE 1 was stood on a raised platform behind the counter so could not estimate how tall she actually was. I also noticed another female who was also stood behind the counter.

I paid FEMALE 1 £15.00 for the Cigarette's and also purchased £5.00 worth of food and confectionary making it a total spend of £20.00 which I paid and then left with the items bought from the venue.

I returned to the Test Purchase Support Officer whom was waiting nearby and I handed the two packets of Marlboro Gold Cigarettes to the Test Purchase Support Officer who placed the items in exhibit bag: N50055603 and then sealed. I produce this as Exhibit DB/1. I then completed a Trading Standards test purchase questionnaire I was given ahead of the operation taking place.

Later that evening we met with Trading Standards Officer, Amanda Butler at Enfield Council and handed over Exhibit DB/1 to her along with the completed questionnaire.

I am employed by the London Borough of Enfield, Civic Centre, Enfield as a duly authorised Senior Trading Standards Officer.
On the 4 August 2022 I accompanied Senior Fair Trading Officer Amanda Butler and a dog handler from Wagtail Ltd on inspections of premises suspected of supplying illegal tobacco products.
At approximately 09:50 a.m. we entered the premises of Maxi Food & Wine Centre, 38 Chase Side, London N14 5PA.
The shop area was laid out as a convenience store mainly selling food and drink products. To the left hand side as you enter the premises was a counter behind which was an open tobacco display gantry. I produce as exhibit CWJW1 a photograph of the counter.
Ms Butler explained the purpose of our visit to a two people who were working in the premises. I now know these people as Ali Ahmet and Smile Arora. Ms Butler subsequently spoke to a person on a phone and explained the purpose of our visit.
The dog and handler and I searched the premises for illegal tobacco products.
From a container behind the counter I seized five packets of 20 Minsk cigarettes, ter packets of 20 NZ Gold cigarettes, two packets of 20 Marlboro Red cigarettes and three packets of 20 Richmond King Size cigarettes. I produce as exhibit CWJW2 a photograph of the cigarettes.

I produce as exhibits CWJW3 a photograph indicating the roof void, CWJW4 a photograph of the tin box and exhibit CWJW5 a photograph of the cigarettes. During the inspection I noted there were a number of boxes containing canisters of nitrous oxide in the storeroom, behind the serving counter and a number of empty boxes. The boxes contained 6 canisters and were marked 'for food use only'. I estimate in the rear storeroom were 16 empty boxes, 45 full boxes and behind the counter 6 boxes. I produce as exhibits CWJW6 a photograph of the empty boxes, CWJW7 a photograph of the rear storage boxes and CWJW8 a photograph of the boxes behind the counter. The cigarettes from behind the counter were sealed in evidence bag the cigarettes from the rear storage area were sealed in evidence bag produce as exhibits CWJW9 evidence bag PO7796612 containing the cigarettes from behind the counter and exhibit CWJW10 evidence bag the cigarettes from the rear storage area. On and behind the counter in the shop were some Vapeman Solo vapes that I believed to be illegal. Also on display were Viagra and Sildenafil that I believe it is illegal to be sold other than from a pharmacy. The 27 Vapeman Solo vapes were seized and sealed in evidence bags and N02624039. I produce as exhibits CWJW11evidence bag 19 vapes and as exhibit CWJW12 evidence bag containing 8 vapes. The 202 packets of Viagra and 15 packets of Sildenafil were seized and sealed in evidence bag I issued a Notice of Seizure 1467. I produce as exhibit CWJW13 a photograph of the Notice of Seizure. We left the premises at approximately 10:50 a.m.





- 8. A CCTV system shall be installed, operated and maintained at the premises. The system shall conform to the Data Protection Act guidelines. Cameras shall monitor the front entrance doors, till area, alcohol displays and the outside of the premises. The time and date shall be generated onto recordings, which shall be of a quality to satisfy the Police and which shall be retained for a minimum of 31 days.
- 9. A Central Station Alarm system shall be installed, operated and maintained at the premises. The system shall comply with EU50131 and shall include a panic button facility.
- 10. Unaccompanied children under 14 are not allowed to enter the premises after 21:00.
- 11. A prominent, clear and legible notice shall be displayed at the exit requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
- 12. There shall be displayed, on the exit doors and immediately inside the premises, a sign stating 'you are entering a drinking control area and no open alcoholic drinks are to be taken off the premises'.

Annex 1 - Mandatory Conditions

Mandatory conditions where the licence authorises the sale of alcohol (Note: Conditions 4, 5, and 7 relate to on-sales only)

These Mandatory Conditions form part of the Operating Schedule of your licence. You must ensure that the operation of the licensed premises complies with these Mandatory Conditions, as well as the Conditions stated in Annex 2 and Annex 3 (if applicable). Failure to do this can lead to prosecution or review of the licence.

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner:
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either -

- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.

7. The responsible person must ensure that -

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures -

(i) beer or cider: 1/2 pint;

(ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

(iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;

- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

8 (i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -

- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Supply of alcohol under a Club Premises Certificate

The mandatory conditions 4 to 8 above will apply. If the club premises certificate authorises the supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises, the following three mandatory conditions must also be included:

- 1. The supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises must be made at a time when the premises are open for the purposes of supplying alcohol to members of the club for consumption on the premises.
- 2. Any alcohol supplied for consumption off the premises must be in a sealed container.
- 3. Any alcohol supplied for consumption off the premises must be made to a member of the club in person.

Supply of alcohol from community premises

The following mandatory condition will replace the first three mandatory conditions above when an application is made for a premises licence by the management committee of community premises and the licensing authority also grants an application for this alternative licence condition to be included in the licence:

1. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by the [management committee / management board / board of trustees].

Since the submission of the Licensing Review Application pertaining to Maxi Food & Wine, 38 Chase Side N14 5PA the following outlines information that was not included in the Licensing Review Application of 26.10.2022: -

- On 26.10.2022 to 23.11.2022 Enfield Council Trading Standards Department ascertained that Aylin Yengin was unable to attend a PACE interview due to pregnancy. The PACE interview was therefore rescheduled for 28.11.2022 whereby a Turkish interpreter was requested to be present.
- On 21.11.2022, Enfield Council's Licensing Department a Licensing enforcement inspection to Maxi Food & Wine -38 Chase Side N14 5PA. Please have regard to Licensing inspection report of 21.11.2022 and photos of Maxi Food & Wine retail premises. Appendix 23

Premises Licence Condition 4.

- All staff shall be trained, and re-trained every six months, with regard to the sale of alcohol.
- During the afore-mentioned inspection, training records of Maxi Food & Wine were inspected. There were two males on the retail premises.
 However, one of the males who was serving behind the shop counter was not within the training records and spoke little English. The other male also spoke limited English but was within the training records.
 Although the said premises licence condition does not stipulate to keep training records, it is due diligence for the retailer to keep training records to confirm staff training.

Premises Licence Condition 8.

• A CCTV system shall be installed, operated and maintained at the premises. The system shall conform to the Data Protection Act guidelines. Cameras shall monitor the front entrance doors, till area, alcohol displays and the outside of the premises. The time and date shall be generated

onto recordings, which shall be of a quality to satisfy the Police and which shall be retained for a minimum of 31 days.

 During the afore-mentioned inspection CCTV appeared to be in use although that staff of Maxi Food & Wine were not able to demonstrate the utilisation of CCTV or 31 days of CCTV footage within the retail premises of Maxi Food & Wine, as outlined within the premises licence condition.

Large cannisters of Nitrous Oxide were displayed for sale (despite advisory letters from Enfield Council Trading Standards Department (Appendices 9 and 11) in addition to outlining the Psychoactive Act 2016 during the seizure of illegal tobacco to Ali Kemal YENGIN on 04.08.2022.

The nitrous oxide cannisters were removed from sale during the Licensing Enforcement Inspection. Drugs paraphernalia were also displayed for sale during the said inspection.

At the conclusion of the inspection, the afore mentioned were explained as breaching the licensing objectives.





In summary, I wish to make supporting representation for the above premises to review the Premises licence on the following objectives.

- Prevention of crime and disorder
- Prevention of public nuisance

From Police perspective there was a number of complaints and incidence related to the above named premises.

The complaints very in nature from nuisance to violent disorder. Police database was checked for the time period between December 2018 and December 2022.

In the period of 4 years there was total of 34 incidence related to the area of the Maxi Food & wine, however only small number was evidentially linked to Maxi Food & wine.

Relevant 8 incidence are as follow:

Police believes that the Premises, premises licence holder and/or DPS, contributed to the ASB/nuisance and crime in the imminent proximity to the premises by not operating in accordance with the licence as per Local authority findings listed in the licence application review.

Annex E

Supporting Representation – Southgate Ward Councillors

I, Cllr loannou and Cllr Joannides are all in agreement that we support the review and believe that Maxi Food & Wine should have its licence revoked. Please accept this response on behalf of all three of us.

We believe this licence should be revoked as they have violated every single one of the licencing objectives; prevention of crime and disorder; public safety; the prevention of public nuisance and protection of children from harm.

The first major concern is the sale of nitrous oxide (laughing gas) on this premises. It is classified as the sale of drug paraphernalia and therefore, raises concerns regarding the usage of the substance and consequently violates all the licencing objectives. It is a threat to public safety and the health of those use it as laughing gas; it fails to protect children from harm as it is a popular recreational drug in children as young as sixteen and it is unclear who Maxi Food and Wine have been selling this to. Enabling misuse of nitrous oxide is unhelpful in the aim of prevention of crime and disorder as it enables drug misuse. It is also a public nuisance as officers found these canisters littered in close proximity to Maxi Food and Wine and the misuse of such substances can contribute to antisocial behaviour. The use of nitrous oxide IS linked to antisocial behaviour.

Following on from this the staff have not completed or at least there is no evidence of completion of the relevant training for the sale of alcohol. This is a breach of regulation and is therefore a threat to public safety as there is a lack of education surrounding the safe sale of alcohol. Furthermore, officers stated that there were no 'challenge 25' signs or stickers on the premises which is therefore a threat to the protection of children from harm as may encourage those not of legal age to attempt to buy alcohol here. This can therefore be classified also as an issue for preventing crime and disorder as it is illegal for children under the age of 18 to buy alcohol.

It is of deep concern that Viagra and Sildenafil were found on the premises. Viagra is only supposed to be bought from regulated sources such as pharmacists and the sale of these drugs at Maxi Food and wine is therefore a threat to public safety as they're being sold improperly and potentially inappropriately with the potential to cause harm. As mentioned in the report, this is a breach of the relevant acts. This obviously undermines public safety.

Additionally, the sale of tobacco at this premises is a serious concern as the tobacco and vapes found here were illegal. Maxi Food and wine have broken the law, and this should not be taken lightly. The tobacco found on the premises does not comply with UK regulation as do the vapes. This not only is a breach of UK law but also a threat to public safety and potentially even children's safety as such (unregulated) products are being sold here. We also find it troubling that that non-duty paid tobacco has links with wider organised crime and therefore there is potentially a

wider and more threatening issue here that undermines most, if not all, the licencing objectives.

I hope this is helpful and you can appreciate our concerns.

Proposed Conditions Arising from the Review Application

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

The Mandatory Conditions are attached and form part of the Operating Schedule of your licence/certificate. You must ensure that the operation of the licensed premises complies with the attached Mandatory Conditions as well as the Conditions in Annex 2 and Annex 3 (if applicable). Failure to do this can lead to prosecution or review of the licence.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

- 3. There shall be no adult entertainment or services, activities or matters ancillary to the use of the premises that may give rise to concern in respect of children.
- 4. All staff shall be trained, and re-trained every six months, with regard to the sale of alcohol.
- 5. Alcohol shall be securely stored, locked away from other stock with limited key access.
- 6. Youths shall be discouraged from loitering outside the premises.
- 7. The 'Challenge 21' proof-of-age scheme shall be operated at the premises.

Remove and replaced with new Condition 12 below.

- 7. A CCTV system shall be installed, operated and maintained at the premises. The system shall conform to the Data Protection Act guidelines. Cameras shall monitor the front entrance doors, till area, alcohol displays and the outside of the premises. The time and date shall be generated onto recordings, which shall be of a quality to satisfy the Police and which shall be retained for a minimum of 31 days.
- 8. A Central Station Alarm system shall be installed, operated and maintained at the premises. The system shall comply with EU50131 and shall include a panic button facility.
- 9. Unaccompanied children under 14 are not allowed to enter the premises after 21:00.
- 10. A prominent, clear and legible notice shall be displayed at the exit requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
- 12. There shall be displayed, on the exit doors and immediately inside the premises, a sign stating 'you are entering a drinking control area and no open alcoholic drinks are to be taken off the premises'.

As this above condition is no longer applicable, it should be removed, and the updated condition can be seen in new proposed Condition 14 below.

Annex 3 - Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

New conditions to be added to the licence:

- 11. Non-duty paid tobacco or alcohol must not be stored or sold from the premises or from any motor-vehicle.
- 12. A 'Think 25' proof of age scheme shall be operated and relevant material shall be displayed at the premises.
- 13. A written record of refused sales shall be kept on the premises and completed when necessary. This record shall be made available to Police and/or the Local Authority upon request and shall be kept for at least one year from the date of the last entry.
- 14. Signs shall be prominently displayed on the exit doors advising customers that the premises is in a Public Space Protection Order Area (or similar) and that alcohol should not be taken off the premises and consumed in the street. These notices shall be positioned at eye level and in a location where they can be read by those leaving the premises.
- 15. Only the Premises Licence Holder or Designated Premises Supervisor shall purchase alcohol and / or tobacco stock.
- 16. Alcohol and tobacco stock shall only be purchased from registered wholesalers.
- 17. The premises licence holder shall ensure that all receipts for goods bought are kept together in a file or folder as evidence that they have been brought into the UK through legal channels. Receipts shall show the following details:
- (a) Seller's name and address;
- (b) Seller's company details, if applicable;
- (c) Seller's VAT details, if applicable.

Copies of these documents shall be retained for no less than 12 months and shall be made available to police or authorised officers of the council on request within five working days of the request. The most recent three months' worth of receipts shall be kept on the premises and made available to the police or authorised officers of the council on request.

- 18. All tobacco products that are not on the tobacco display shall be stored in a container clearly marked 'Tobacco Stock'. This container shall be kept within the storeroom or behind the sales counter.
- 19. Tobacco products shall only be taken from the tobacco display behind the sales counter to make a sale.

20. No Nitrous oxide (laughing gas) should be stored or sold to consumers whereby it is reasonable for the retailer to know that the Nitrous Oxide would be misused by the consumer or to any persons under the age of 18 years old.

Please have regard to Appendix 25 (Companies House Printout) and Appendix 26 (Photocopy of Officers notebook re: inspection 4.8.2022).
- On 26th October 2022, at approx 10.25 HRS, an Officer went to Maxi Food & Wine to hand deliver Blue Notice and Licensing Review Application. The Officer spoke to Kemal Yengin alias (Kemal Altun) via phone and requested to speak to DPS/PH Aylin Yengin. Ali Kemal Yengin (Kemal Altun) explained that his wife Aylin Yengin recently gave birth and was therefore unavailable. The Officer explained that Enfield Council had submitted a Licensing Review application because of a seizure of tobacco from Maxi Food & Wine's retail premises 4.8.2022. I am writing to you as the Owner of Maxi Food & Wine 38 Chase Side London N14 5PA.

Alleged Offence(s):

On 31st March 2022, x2 packets Marlboro Gold Cigarettes were purchased from Maxi food & Wine, 38 Chase Side London N14 5PA. The cigarettes packaging did not display the requisite colour namely Pantone 448c and the labelling and/or health warnings on the packaging was not in English. Contrary to Section 15(1) of the Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2016 and Regulation 48 of the Tobacco & related Products Regulations 2016

On 4th August 2022 at Maxi Food & Wine-38 Chase Side, London, N14 5PA you did knowingly keep or allow to be kept goods namely cigarettes and e-cigarettes/vapes that have been imported without payment of duty or which have otherwise been unlawfully imported. **Contrary to Section 144 of the Licensing Act 2003**

On 4th August 2022 at Maxi Food & Wine-38 Chase Side, London, N14 5PA you did have in possession for supply tobacco, namely 50 packets of cigarettes that failed to comply with the requirements of Regulation 7(1) of the Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015 in that the exterior of the packaging did not have the permitted colour, that being Pantone 448c applied to it. **Contrary to Regulation 15(1) of the Standardised Packaging of Tobacco products Regulations 2015**

On 4th August 2022 at Maxi Food & Wine-38 Chase Side, London, N14 5PA you did have in possession for supply tobacco that failed to comply with the requirements of Regulation 7 and 11 of the Tobacco & Related Products Regulations 2016 because the labelling and/or health warnings on the packaging was not in English. **Contrary to Regulation 48 of the Tobacco & related Products Regulations 2016**

On 4th August 2022 at Maxi Food & Wine-38 Chase Side, London, N14 5PA you did have in possession for supply tobacco that failed to comply with the requirements of Regulation 7 and 11 of the Tobacco & Related Products Regulations 2016 because the labelling and/or health warnings on the packaging was not in English. **Contrary to Regulation 48 of the Tobacco & related Products Regulations 2016**

On 4th August 2022 at Maxi Food & Wine-38 Chase Side, London, N14 5PA you did have in possession for supply tobacco namely E-cigarettes/ Vapeman Solos that failed to comply with the requirements of Part 6 of the Tobacco & Related Products Regulations 2016/ Tobacco Products and Nicotine Inhaling Products (Amendment) (EU Exit) Regulations 2020. Contrary to Regulation 48 of the Tobacco & related Products Regulations 2016

On 4th August 2022, medicines, namely x22 packets of Viagra (202 Viagra tablets) and x15 sachets of Sildenafil Oral were also seized from Maxi Food & Wine-38 Chase Side, London, N14 5PA. **Contrary to the Human Medicines Regulations 2012**. The afore-mentioned medicines have subsequently been referred to the Medicines & Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency (MHRA).

Trade Marks Act 1994

All products that belong to a registered brand holder (trademark) must be purchased from a reputable supplier. This includes cigarettes/tobacco and alcohol.

Tobacco Products

All tobacco products must comply with The Tobacco and Related Products Regulations 2016, The Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015 and Licensing Act 2003.

Traceability

General Food Regulations states that all businesses are required to have a system and procedures in place to identify the person from whom they have been supplied food, drinks and/or tobacco. The purchase of these products must be "traceable" and should be evidenced by documentation/receipts which must be available for inspection upon request.

After careful consideration of the evidence, whilst there is enough evidence to consider prosecution pertaining to the seized tobacco, in this instance, Enfield Council are issuing this warning letter regarding the afore-mentioned non-duty paid/illegal cigarettes and non-compliant Vapes/E-cigarettes.

However, Enfield Council requires you to sign over the non-duty paid /illegal cigarettes, Non-compliant Vapes/E-cigarettes and illegal medicines for disposal in accordance with the Consumer Protection Act.

Please sign and date the Voluntary Surrender form and return the afore-mentioned form to within 7 days.

If you do not agree to sign over the non-duty paid tobacco, then Enfield Council will apply to the court for forfeiture and seek to recover the costs of doing so from Maxi Food & Wine.

Licensing Act 2003- Premises Licence Conditions

This warning letter has been issued separately to the pending Licensing Review Hearing regarding the Licensing Review application to revoke the premises licence of Maxi Food & Wine.

Please consider this letter to be a warning as to your future conduct of your retail premises namely Maxi Food & Wine-38 Chase Side London N14 5PA.

From the issuing of this warning letter, should smuggled goods be discovered in your licensed premises or motor-vehicles associated with your licensed premises, then Enfield Council's Trading Standards Authority shall consider prosecution of any subsequent seizures of illegal tobacco.

Enfield Council will continue to conduct test-purchasing sessions and Illegal Tobacco inspections to your retail premises and retailers within the Borough of Enfield.
