Member Comments on Area Forum Review Report

Eric Jukes:

Thanks for the Report. My only comment which I would welcome being considered relates (I think) to 4.4 on the format of the meetings. And, quuite, frankly, it applies to many other - non-forum meetings. We are now in a different age and the format of all types of council meetings needs to reflect that. The public are bombarded with imagery on television and the internet - and the younger generation have come into a world full of such imagery and know of nothing else - unless they step into Enfield Council Meetings which have a format unchanged for a hundred years! Meetings need to have more than one publicly viewable screen - one will show the agenda and the point in the agenda that the nmeeting has reached. Another screen should show the location which is being discussed. This can be a simple streetmap.co.uk map and maybe a google earth image of the street or location. An officer should be present specifically to handle the audio/visual side and should be able to bring at least a map on the screen when a particular road is discussed - even if it is a spontaneous unnotified question from the floor. Obviously the officer needs to be specially competent in handling fast searches etc - some can't even get their powerpoint running without a wait!

And whatever happened to the council webcasts of meetings? I rather think they disappeared without trace during our administration!

But it is only by getting a much more slick (I hate the word!) and punchy and well illustrated presentation that the meetings can hope to engage with the younger generation.

We should try and build on what we have, invite youth groups other hard to reach groups to particular meetings, perhaps use the ability to set agenda items to achieve this.
