2 Describe the change, why it is needed, what is the objective of the change and what is the possible impact of the change:

The Sustainability Service is seeking to have the Fuel Poverty Strategy and Action Plan adopted as official Council Policy. There are 12,927 households suffering from fuel poverty in Enfield, this is the 6th largest total in London and the 37th largest total in England. Fuel poverty has major impact on health, it suppresses Enfield's economy, it impacts the long term outcomes of children, increases the borough's carbon footprint and highlights poor quality housing.

The Action Plan is divided into 3 sections, detailing the initial steps that need to be taken.

Data

- We need to use the data we already have access to more effectively to enable us identify fuel poor residents with greater accuracy than the national statistics currently allow.

Raising Awareness, Improving advice and Maximising Income

- Fuel poor residents are not always aware that help is available or willing to accept it. We need to promote the professional help available in the borough and the steps that residents can take to help themselves.
- Removing someone from fuel poverty doesn't always require major building work. Good quality advice can have

a major impact on a fuel poor household by switching it to a cheaper energy supplier, increasing income via employability skills or benefit maximisation and teaching householders how to use existing heating systems more efficiently.

Energy Efficient Homes

- Some homes are so inefficient that practical energy efficiency measures are required to remove a household from fuel poverty.
- We need to work with private sector landlords and housing providers to encourage them to improve the quality of their properties by promoting the range of grants and financing options available. Where necessary, we also need to use the Energy Efficiency Regulations for the Private Rented Sector, which will prevent landlords letting properties that fall below EPC band E from 2018 and HHSRS which enables the Council to enforce against landlords letting homes where low temperatures can be classified as a category 1 hazard.
- We also need to continue to improve the quality of the Housing Revenue Account stock. All Council homes should be above EPC band E by 2018.
- Finally, we need to demonstrate the savings that the health sector can make by improving the energy efficiency of homes occupied by vulnerable residents suffering from cold related illnesses.

The current action plan aims to improve or implement the infrastructure necessary to tackle fuel poverty in Enfield. Ultimately, we're seeking to quantify the extent of the problem in Enfield using our own data and to reduce the number of households suffering from fuel poverty.
