1.0 INTRODUCTION

KP Acoustics Ltd, Britannia House, 11 Glenthorne Road, London, W6 OLH, has been commissioned by Berf Catering Ltd., 77 Boundaries Road, London, N9 8LD, to undertake a noise breakout assessment of an existing restaurant at the above address. The measured noise levels will be used to investigate and assess the noise impact from the ground floor restaurant to nearby residential spaces, in order to establish any remedial measures necessary to facilitate the recommendation of mitigation measures as required to minimise noise breakout.

This report presents the results of the assessment of the measured performance of the building's external fabric and concludes with recommendations on remedial noise control measures which could be adopted.

2.0 PROCEDURE AND EQUIPMENT

2.1 Noise Breakout Measurements

In order to assess the effectiveness of current elements of the external building fabric in attenuating noise break-out, manual measurements were undertaken utilising pink noise. A spatial average of the resulting noise levels was obtained by using a moving microphone technique over a minimum period of 15 seconds at each of two positions within the main area of the ground floor restaurant.

The same measurement procedure was repeated approximately 1m outside the windows and door of the front façade, in order to assess the noise break-out from the noisiest areas of the restaurant to the external environment.

The instrumentation used during the sound insulation investigation is shown in Table 2.2 below.

3.0 RESULTS

3.1 Sound Insulation Investigation

The main parameter used throughout this document to express airborne sound insulation of separating constructions is D_w . All specifications in this report will therefore be given with respect to this descriptor. It should be noted that there is a difference of about 5-8 dB between the laboratory sound insulation R_w value and the D_w measured on site, with the latter being lower as it is dependent on various parameters such as junction detailing, workmanship, penetrations and flanking.

Summarised results of the airborne tests are shown in Tables 3.2 and 3.3. Source noise levels were in the region of approximately 100 dB(A) within the main bar space.

4.0 DISCUSSION

It is understood that the restaurant features live music, played during opening hours. Typically, this music consists of 1-2 electroacoustic instruments, and amplified vocals. This music generally features fairly low-level, low-frequency noise and is dominated by the middle – high frequencies. It is understood that complaints have been made regarding noise breakout from the restaurant during live music by a number of properties in the immediate vicinity. We therefore propose to base this assessment on predicted received noise levels compared with recommended internal noise levels stipulated in BS8233:2014. It is understood from measurements of typical live music within the restaurant, that noise levels in a typical night would be expected in the region of 85dB(A).

Following a visual inspection of the site, the closest noise sensitive receivers to the bar have been identified as being above the site. The receivers above the property would be potentially subjected to transmission through the breakout element of noise from the building's external façade, in addition to direct noise transmission through the floors.

An additional representative noise sensitive receiver would be located on the opposite side of Bounces Road, at a distance of approximately 20m.

In the absence of environmental noise data, we would base our assessment on ensuring that internal noise levels suitable to provide good resting conditions, as stipulated by BS8233:2014, are not exceeded within neighbouring noise sensitive residences.

BS8233:2014 recommends internal noise levels of 30-35dB(A) for night-time and daytime respectively. BS8233 also states that a partially open window typically provides 10-15dB attenuation. As such, we would set a provisional noise emissions criteria of 40dB(A) at 1m from the representative noise sensitive receivers, as a result of noise emissions from the restaurant.

4.1 Prediction for Noise Breakout through External Facade

Using the source level of 85dB(A) as expected within the restaurant as a result of low level live music, and the measured D_w rating of the building façade, Table 4.1 shows the predicted sound pressure level at the nearest noise sensitive receiver, and at a second receiver across Bounces Road, due to activity within the ground floor space, compared with the previously mentioned noise emissions criteria. Detailed calculations are shown in Appendices B1-2.

As can be seen from table 4.1, the breakout through the external façade provides a level which will marginally exceed internal noise levels recommended by BS8233:2014, at the closest receiver. The secondary receivers would be expected, at this source noise level, to receive noise levels which would be inaudible under typical conditions. However, neighbouring receivers at a closer distance may experience noise breakout from the front façade of the restaurant. Furthermore, this does not take into account noise generated by audiences within the restaurant, or instances where music levels may increase.

It is understood that the primary noise sensitive receiver dwelling above the restaurant will also be subjected to noise intrusion through direct transfer, i.e. noise transfer through the party floor element. At this stage it has not been possible to test the existing performance of the floor due to

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limitations on access, however once this test has been undertaken, further assessment will be made for direct transfer and this report will be amended accordingly.

5.0 Remedial Measures

External Facades

It is understood that the existing front façade of the property is a double glazed composition, with a lobby door system, which is typically kept closed throughout any live music performance. From a subjective impression on site, the glazed section is currently the weakest element of the front façade.

In order to improve the performance of the front façade, the Client is proposing to replace the existing glazing system with a triple glazed system. At this stage the specific attenuation characteristics of the glazing system are unknown, however with a triple glazed system installed, it would be expected that a significant reduction in music noise breakout would be achieved. Once glazing specifications are finalised, this report will be amended to include predictions for future noise breakout.

Direct Transfer

The Client has proposed to install upgrade measures to both sides of the party floor in order to minimise noise transmission to the resident above. At this stage the existing performance and construction of the floor is unknown, and will require further investigation prior to the issue of remedial advice. Once sound insulation testing of the existing structure has been undertaken on site, this report will be updated to include recommendations for the upgrade of the party floor.

6.0 CONCLUSION

A noise breakout assessment has been undertaken at 77 Bounces Road, London. The results of the survey have enabled the assessment of noise propagation of typical activity to the most representative noise sensitive receivers. This has been undertaken in order to allow the proposal of noise control measures that could be applied external building elements.

Noise levels have been predicted at the nearest noise sensitive receivers in comparison to the recommendations of BS8233:2014, and would be expected to have potential negative impact on the amenity of neighbouring residents, provided that no mitigation measures are implemented.

This report will be updated and reissued following the finalisation of Client proposals, and the undertaking of direct transfer tests for internal building elements, which due to limitations on site access have as of yet been unobtainable. Full mitigation and remedial measures advice will be issued in the updated report to follow.

APPENDIX A



GENERAL ACOUSTIC TERMINOLOGY

Decibel scale - dB

In practice, when sound intensity or sound pressure is measured, a logarithmic scale is used in which the unit is the 'decibel', dB. This is derived from the human auditory system, where the dynamic range of human hearing is so large, in the order of 10¹³ units, that only a logarithmic scale is the sensible solution for displaying such a range.

Decibel scale, 'A' weighted - dB(A)

The human ear is less sensitive at frequency extremes, below 125Hz and above 16Khz. A sound level meter models the ears variable sensitivity to sound at different frequencies. This is achieved by building a filter into the Sound Level Meter with a similar frequency response to that of the ear, an A-weighted filter where the unit is dB(A).

Leq

The sound from noise sources often fluctuates widely during a given period of time. An average value can be measured, the equivalent sound pressure level $L_{\rm eq}$. The $L_{\rm eq}$ is the equivalent sound level which would deliver the same sound energy as the actual fluctuating sound measured in the same time period.

L₁₀

This is the level exceeded for no more than 10% of the time. This parameter is often used as a "not to exceed" criterion for noise.

L₉₀

This is the level exceeded for no more than 90% of the time. This parameter is often used as a descriptor of "background noise" for environmental impact studies.

L_{max}

This is the maximum sound pressure level that has been measured over a period.

Octave Bands

In order to completely determine the composition of a sound it is necessary to determine the sound level at each frequency individually. Usually, values are stated in octave bands. The audible frequency region is divided into 11 such octave bands whose centre frequencies are defined in accordance with international standards. These centre frequencies are: 16, 31.5, 63, 125, 250, 500, 1000, 2000, 4000, 8000 and 16000 Hertz.

Environmental noise terms are defined in B\$7445, Description and Measurement of Environmental Noise.

APPENDIX A



APPLIED ACOUSTIC TERMINOLOGY

Addition of noise from several sources

Noise from different sound sources combines to produce a sound level higher than that from any individual source. Two equally intense sound sources operating together produce a sound level which is 3dB higher than a single source and 4 sources produce a 6dB higher sound level.

Attenuation by distance

Sound which propagates from a point source in free air attenuates by 6dB for each doubling of distance from the noise source. Sound energy from line sources (e.g. stream of cars) drops off by 3dB for each doubling of distance.

Subjective impression of noise

Hearing perception is highly individualised. Sensitivity to noise also depends on frequency content, time of occurrence, duration of sound and psychological factors such as emotion and expectations. The following table is a guide to explain increases or decreases in sound levels for many scenarios.

Change in sound level (dB)	Change in perceived loudness
1	Imperceptible
3	Just barely perceptible
6	Clearly noticeable
10	About twice as loud

Transmission path(s)

The transmission path is the path the sound takes from the source to the receiver. Where multiple paths exist in parallel, the reduction in each path should be calculated and summed at the receiving point. Outdoor barriers can block transmission paths, for example traffic noise. The effectiveness of barriers is dependent on factors such as its distance from the noise source and the receiver, its height and construction.

Ground-borne vibration

In addition to airborne noise levels caused by transportation, construction, and industrial sources there is also the generation of ground-borne vibration to consider. This can lead to structure-borne noise, perceptible vibration, or in rare cases, building damage.

Sound insulation - Absorption within porous materials

Upon encountering a porous material, sound energy is absorbed. Porous materials which are intended to absorb sound are known as absorbents, and usually absorb 50 to 90% of the energy and are frequency dependent. Some are designed to absorb low frequencies, some for high frequencies and more exotic designs being able to absorb very wide ranges of frequencies. The energy is converted into both mechanical movement and heat within the material; both the stiffness and mass of panels affect the sound insulation performance.

Detailed below is additional information not previously included in the review application submitted on 15/04/16:

26.05.16 – Noise Breakout Assessment received along with letters and petition. The report states that no checks have been carried out in the above properties. This means they can therefore have no understanding of how residents above the parade are being affected. In relation to the letters from nearby businesses it is unlikely that any of these would be trading after 21:00 so would not be affected by the music. Letters from musicians – they perform at the premises so it is in their interest to have live music remain on the licence. Letters from residents – the officer notes show that it is poor sound insulation that has played a large part and that the issue is with the music travelling upwards. This results in only a limited number of people being affected. Just because not everyone in the street is being affected does not mean the problem is not a real one. The noise officers who have visited the complainant's property are the only objective witnesses and they on more than one occasion have deemed the level of the music to be a statutory nuisance.

28.05.16 – 01:21 - Complaint received from a new complainant at a different address in relation to loud music. The complainant stated that it usually stops at 23:00 but was still ongoing. Noise Officers called the complainant at 01:45 but there was no answer. They visited the premises at 02:30 and the premises was closed.

31.05.16 – Senior Licensing Enforcement Officer spoke to the complainant and their landlord who both confirmed that they have not received any requests from anyone at the premises or from the acoustic team asking to carry out noise assessments from their property. The residents confirmed that they are still disturbed by the music but have stopped complaining as they feel it is pointless. They advised that although the music has been slightly quieter they have still been able to hear it every day and that at the weekend it is worse. They advised that it usually starts at 21:00 and continues until around 00:30 – 00:45. When asked if they would be willing to attend the hearing both declined stating that they would feel safer if they remained anonymous.

- **31.05.16** Additional letters received objecting to the licence review. All appear to be written in the same handwriting. As a result of reading the noise report and letters the following questions where sent to the Premises Licence Holder via email:
- 1. What type of sound insulation has been attached to the ceiling? Please provide the specifications.

- 2. Is all the ceiling being insulted or just part of it? If just part please describe the extent of the insulation?
- 3. When was the insulation installed?
- 4. Is it complete? If not when will it be finished?
- 5. Have you carried out any work on the windows? If so what? Please provide the details of what was installed and when.
- 6. The acoustic report states that once checks have been carried out on the floor of the above properties further assessments will be made. Has this been done?
- 7. When will the final updated noise report be provided?
- 8. Building material invoices please provide an explanation as to what the items are, what has been done with them and when.
- 9. Studiospares invoice please provide an explanation as to what the items are, what has been done with them and when.
- 10. Does live music have to be amplified?
- 11. Would you be willing to reduce the current licensed hours/days live music is provided?
- 12. Have you had any live music since receiving the licence review application? If so when? Times, dates.
