## 2. Describe the change, why it is needed, what is the objective of the change and what is the possible impact of the change:

The Edmonton Leeside Area Action Plan (AAP) is a statutory planning document that will form part of Enfield's Local Development Plan. It is specifically designed to:

- Support and guide regeneration;
- Guide public and private investment that is needed to enable transformational change;
- · Protect areas sensitive to change;
- · Resolve conflicting objectives; and
- Provide robust policies to help ensure that future development and investment meets the needs of new and existing communities.

The AAP sets out a regeneration framework for Edmonton Leeside and aims to create and support sustainable communities. It provides specific planning and regeneration guidance for development proposals, such as where new housing and jobs should be located, as well as improvements to open spaces and public transport connections, and additional community facilities and local services.

The AAP provides a more detailed and area-specific planning policy and development framework. Whilst the AAP is set within the framework of adopted Core Strategy Policy 37 Central Leeside and Policy 38 Meridian Water, the AAP evidence base supports a revised and higher quantum of homes and jobs at Meridian Water. New development proposals coming forward within the Edmonton Leeside area will be expected to accord with the policies and proposals contained within the AAP.

It is expected that the Edmonton Leeside AAP will have a positive impact on people with disability as the AAP will support greatly improved connections and transport facilities, allowing people with disability to move much more easily across the area and beyond to access homes, jobs, and community and leisure facilities. Children and young people would also benefit from the construction of new educations facilities within the area. Whilst the impact of the policies is likely to be positive for other equalities groups, who will benefit from the new homes, new jobs, and new community infrastructure such as schools, green spaces and healthcare facilities, the broad reduction in inequality is not likely to benefit any single group within the community.

The impact of the AAP on poverty and deprivation indicators will take time to deliver measureable change. In the medium to long term, it is expected that the AAP will have a positive impact upon the area. Tackling social and economic inequality is particularly important in this area of the borough which experiences high levels of deprivation, for example in terms of income, educational attainment, worklessness, and health outcomes. The AAP will support improvements and access to good quality homes, the local economy, employment prospects, the transport infrastructure, education, skills and training and the quality of the environment. Development must benefit the existing residents of the area as well as those residents moving in. To ensure existing residents benefit from the new opportunities and facilities, the AAP supports and requires greatly improved access and connectivity, linking the eastern and western areas through sustainable transport modes. Planning obligations will be required to support existing residents with their training needs, while affordable homes options will increase the range and quality of available housing in the area.
