### Comparison of Flu uptake by risk group

- Generally, Enfield has low flu uptake compared with England
- In Enfield, Roughly 2/3<sup>rd</sup> of 65+ population had the flu vaccine last year (Sept 2019 until March 2020)
- This year, more than half of 65+ age group had the vaccine by 21st November



#### **Enfield summary:**

- As at 21st November, nearly 41,000 residents (31% of eligible cohort) had the flu vaccine via GP practices.
- Over half of people age over 65 had the vaccine.
- Low uptake among children age 4- 11 and pregnant women.




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# Percentage uptake by age and gender






# Flu vaccine uptake by ethnicity and religion



- Ethnicity: High uptake among White and Asians.
- Ethnicity: Low uptake among Black and Mixed groups.
- Religion: High uptake among Jewish, Hindu and Buddhist groups.
- Religion: Low uptake among Muslim community.

# Flu vaccine uptake by deprivation and first language spoken





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- Deprivation: High uptake in least and 2<sup>nd</sup> least deprived areas.
- Deprivation: Low uptake in most deprived areas.
- Language spoken: High uptake among Greek and Bengali community
- Language spoken: Low uptake among Turkish, Somali and Polish community.

  - Engagement with Turkish and Somali communities
  - Webinars parents networks, faith forum, public via Health

## **Actions continued**

- Homeless cohort added to eligible list for pharmacies
- Vaccine hesitancy training for staff
- Engagement with NMUH re low uptake among pregnant women
- Primary school & Y7 weekend/ holiday clinics, return to schools following self isolation, individual phone calls to parents who decline/ accept alternative vaccine.
