London Borough of Enfield Coat of Arms

The shield is gold with, across the centre, wavy horizontal bars, the two outside ones being green, the two inside ones silver and a blue one in the middle. These bars represent, as to the blue and silver, the Borough's connection with the new river and, as to the green, the green belt areas and open spaces. The heraldic creature in the middle is an "Enfield", which is a mythological beast with the head of a fox, the chest of a hound, the talons of an eagle, the body of a lion and the hindquarters and tail of a wolf.

The two beasts on either side of the shield are, on the right, again an "Enfield", which was a feature of the Arms of the former Borough of Enfield; and on the left, a lion, one of the principal elements of the Arms of the former Borough of Edmonton.

The crest depicts the head of a stag, an important component from the former Southgate Borough Council's Arms. Round the neck are red Tudor Roses which show the association with the Duchy of Lancaster.

The Mayoralty

The origin of the office of Mayor goes back to the days when Mayors had much wider authority and power than they do today. However, the importance of the position is still widely recognised and remains the highest office that the residents of the Borough, through their elected representatives, can confer. The Mayor is elected on a yearly basis from within the Council's membership. The Mayor should be non-political and must be seen to represent every section of the community, regardless of political persuasion.

The Mayor is the Borough's first Citizen and represents Enfield at some 400 plus engagements during the year in addition to chairing Council Meetings. Within the Borough the Mayor takes precedence over everyone apart from the Sovereign or the Sovereign's official representative. The role of the modern Mayor is to reflect the aims and strategies of the Council. During most engagements the Mayor will wear the chain and badge of office. Red robes are normally worn only for specific ceremonial occasions.
